## The Pastor's Corner

### THE TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY

Yes, we are trying. We are trying to keep up. The church struggles with this. As a history major, I remember studying about WWII. Following The Great War, Europe was exhausted. Coiffers were depleted. While France and Russia settled into healing, Germany struggled to survive...and to face the future. As Germany faced the future, they also put stock in modernizing. When WWII broke out the Allies discovered how unprepared they were. While they had been sitting back, Germany had modernized and were stepping into the future. France and Russia's military was outdated and unprepared. Even Britain and the US scrambled to catch up. The Church can be like this. In our homes we have cable, internet, cell phones, and televisions. Most people do not keep the radio on; they keep the television on. We don't sit and listen to the news, we watch it. Ours has become a visual world. Ours has become an electronic world. We in the Church continue to struggle with how to fit in this world. How do we keep our comfort and stay open. People are use to visuals: How do we become visual? People are use to getting information sooner...not wait for print or "snail mail" as some call it. Sometimes we find that we are unprepared for the future and even the present. What steps do we take? What pace to we take?

One of the places we are trying to catch up is with email. Council voted to increase Trinity's use of email. This means that **this is the final mailed copy of the Newsletter.** Starting in May, we will be emailing the Newsletter. Now don't get all worried. We know that some people do not have email; so, we will also have some printed copies. These will be left on the table in the hall. If you presently received the Newsletter and we do not have your email address, please send your email address to [www.trinity-umc.com](http://www.trinity-umc.com). We are especially thoughtful that some of us have moved away, and we want to stay in touch. Please, please, send us your email.

In addition to the Newsletter, we are also planning to replace the "green cards". Council voted to send the Committee reminders via email. So we have sent the last of the postcards. We are trying to take advantage of technology that many of us are using to save the congregation's money. The money we can save in ink, paper, copier cost per copy, and mailing expense is substantial. We want to be good stewards.

## ATONEMENT

Aren't prisms beautiful? As light shines through a prism, it divides into all kinds of colors. Depending on your point of viewing, various colors will appear. Some facets display green while others show red. Some are violet while others are yellow. All the colors are there, but where are you standing when the light comes through? The Doctrine of Atonement is like this. The Doctrine of Atonement is one of the most important doctrines the church has. For the Children of Israel, Rosh Shoshanna celebrates God giving Abraham a ram to replace Isaac. The story continues in Leviticus with the offering of two scapegoats. One goat is killed and his blood poured out for the sins of the people. The other goat is beaten for the sins of the people. If the goat makes it down the beating line alive, it is taken out into the wilderness. (Lev. 16) In the Mideast, blood sacrifice was the way to go. Human sacrifice was the practice. An eye for an eye; blood for blood. The grace or good news to the Jews was that Yahweh allowed animal blood to be substituted for human blood. Ergo: a ram substituted for Isaac; the goat instead of the people of Israel.

Atonement is the teaching that asks: how does my relationship with God get repaired when I sin? AT ONE MENT. How can I become one with God again? One view of the prism is this doctrine of substitution. Followers of Jesus, look at Jesus' death as the updated version of this Old Testament atonement. Look at Jesus' death through a prism. Some see the death as a substitution. He dies for us. The human sacrifice replaces the animal sacrifice.

Within this substitution atonement the prism breaks out more colors. Jesus takes our place, my place. He takes our place but to whom is the sacrifice directed? One facet says that because God is perfect, he cannot allow the imperfect to come into his presence. So the blood is used to cover us (expiation). Yahweh requires the blood of an unblemished sacrifice for himself.

Another facet says that it is not Yahweh that has to be appeased. It is the Devil. When humans sin, they lose their souls to the devil. In order for us to become one with God again, we must be bought back or ransomed. Biblical scholars call this the Ransom theory of atonement. Jesus died to buy us back. "You were bought with a price. You have been 'redeemed'."

"Jews want signs; Greeks want wisdom".

Not all cultures are based on blood sacrifice. Another one of the facets in the Doctrine of Atonement is that Jesus died because he would not desert us. If he had just gotten quiet. If he just stopped standing for the reuniting of God with sinners. If he had just clung to the religious rules instead of rightness in the heart, they would not have killed him. If he had abandoned his call, the religious would have left him alone. He would not have been killed. Here the focus is on love and faithfulness. "God loved us while we were yet sinners". His life was not taken because blood was required; his life was taken, his blood was shed because like his Heavenly Father, he would not abandon us. Like others before him, his life was taken because he remained faithful to the course God had called him to proclaim. The Doctrine of Incarnation in part proclaims that God and Man united to show us the way, to walk the walk, to not just tell but to show the way to live.

Each age seems to view the meaning and the gift of Christ's life and death through their own prism. Different denominations look through different facets. Substitution. Expiation. Ransomed and redeemed. Faithfulness and incarnation. These are all facets of The Doctrine of Atonement. I don't know through which facet you view the death of Jesus. They are different. But they all have the same aim. How do we become one with God? How do we reconnect and find wholeness? God seeks us out. God goes ahead of us to reunite us so that once again, we are walking with him. Whichever path you take, may you experience the presence of the One who made you and calls to you; may you find the wholeness and the healing, and may this walk grant you a life of love and grace.

### **LOOKING FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS**

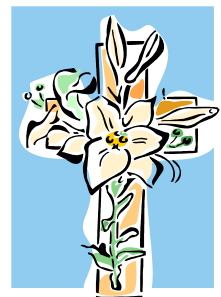

### **“Come Together”**

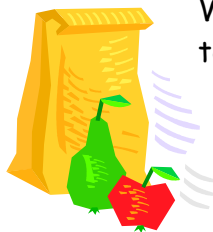

## UMCOR Kits For Annual Conference

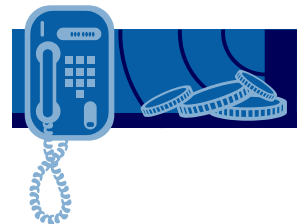
Every year the Trinity United Methodist Women (UMW) participate in the kits for conference drive for Annual Conference. The kits are basic items gathered for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) for world-wide distribution. There are four types of kits: birthing kit, school kit, baby/layette kit, and health kit. Trinity UMW will be putting together two types of kits for collection at Annual Conference in June.

The items needed for the health kit are: 1 hand towel (15x25 in. to 17x27 in.) no kitchen towels, 1 washcloth, 1 comb (large, sturdy, not pocket-size), 1 metal nail file or fingernail clippers, 1 bar of soap (3 oz and up), 1 toothbrush (single brush only in original wrapper/no child's brushes), 6 adhesive sterile bandages (Band-Aids), NO TOOTHPASTE PLEASE. UMCOR buys toothpaste with appropriate expiration dates.

The items needed for the baby/layette kit are: 6 cloth diapers, 2 shirts or one-piece body suits (size 3-6months), 2 baby washcloths, 2 gowns or sleepers (size 3-6 months), 2 diaper pins, 1 sweater open in front (size 3-6 months), 2 receiving blankets.

The UMW would like to invite everyone to participate in this year's kits for conference drive. Items will be due on Sunday, May 6, 2012. You may want to collect a few of the listed items or complete an entire kit. All items must be new. Any monetary donations will be used to complete the kits or to pay for processing and shipping. Because of the strict rules in other countries, please do not add items not listed or put more than the listed quantity. Personal notes or cards are also not allowed. Please place items in designated boxes in the hall. The UMW will inventory donations and add any items needed to complete the kits. Thank you for prayerfully considering this project. 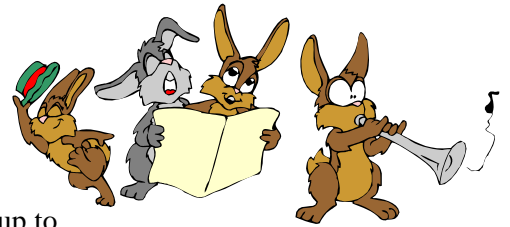
United Methodist Men News

We are so pleased to see new parents and children joining us on Wednesday nights and Sunday afternoons. Please know we are delighted to have you come and join us!



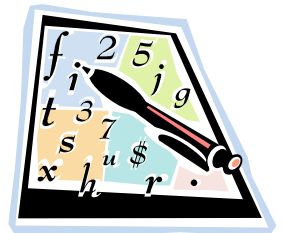
## children's fellowship news

## Notes from the Lay Listener

The Council this month was dominated by several issues. All were important and represent changes for the Church business. One that stood out the most for me, because of the potential savings, was the decision to change how we deliver the Church Newsletter. The decision was predicated on several things. Our copier costs have gone up every year, we now have over 152 people that have signed up for our mass email, and the bulk rate delivery of the newsletter has been delayed in the last two months an average of 12 days from mailing to delivery. When you look at the copier costs for



our eight page newsletter and the cost of mailing we spend over \$400 per month delivering the newsletter. Emailing to the 152 with email will save \$285 per month.

Wanted: someone to provide assistance in running the soundboard for the 11:00 service. Both of the people that have been regularly available have increased their out of town responsibilities for their work. This is another one of many jobs that we don't recognize until someone is not there to do it. Please speak to the pastor.

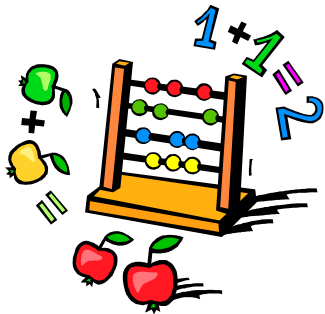
