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JUST IN CASE YOU WONDERED

Yes, it is....And for me this means Charge Conference prep. So I am working on Nominations and John is starting to work on budget estimates. If you have a heart for children of any age, and believe that helping them have a relationship with God is important, consider serving in this way.

In the back of the sanctuary is a room that has a sofa, some chairs, and a small table. As our children are growing, they are growing more active. We are trying to meet everyone's needs. So, if your child just can't sit still, but nursery isn't an option, please feel free to take them to this space. There are crayons and some quiet items. For those of us whose children are past this stage, we are looking for children's Christian books. Please remember an adult does need to be with the child at all times, and please straighten up the space as you leave.

A YEAR IN REVIEW

Can you believe it has been a year? Wow!! It's been a busy year. Last summer the adult mission trip; this summer the youth mission trip. Pumpkin patches, festivals, apple butter, and more. We have grown in numbers by about 20% (keep welcoming and loving). With the growth has come some tightness in sharing space. This is both literal space and time. I made a decision to allow the 8:30 am service to be a complete service. Like the 11 am service, it runs about an hour and fifteen minutes. With the growth in numbers of people has come expense of programming. So we are sorting out time, space, and resources.

A NOTE FROM THE LAY LISTENER: THANK THEM AND THANK YOU

If we weren't paid for our work, would we still give our all? Would we even show up? Money is a strong motivator to determine how we spend our time and where we invest our hearts. If this is true, a non-profit entity, like the church, needs to pay attention to how volunteers, some of whom function as unpaid staff, are treated and retained.

No church can function unless members give their time. As Christians we are called to serve no matter the cost. However, that does not mean the church should treat people with disrespect or disregard. In fact, quite the opposite. We must be more sensitive to and considerate of those who are giving of their time and talent to help the church advance its mission and to serve others. Here are some new ways to look at the ministry of volunteers.

1. **DON'T TAKE ANYONE FOR GRANTED.** Some leaders lament a lack of devoted followers willing to give more time to the church and cite the "20 percent of the people do 80 percent of the work" statistic. But what about the 80 percent of the people who do 20 percent of the work? Too many churches take those people for granted. What would happen if the ushers didn't show up or if the choir stopped rehearsing? The reality is they don't have to serve. Every chance you get, thank volunteers, let them know their work matters and tell them how much they bring to the body of Christ. At Trinity 21% of active members are in a leadership role. Fully 52% of our regular attending members are involved in more than just attending.
2. **ALWAYS HAVE A PLAN B.** Children get sick, cars break down and sometimes, people simply forget. The Leaders need to consider what would happen if volunteers did not show up. For example: It's Sunday, and one of your nursery workers isn't there. Are you prepared? Do you have a "go-to" list of trained people for whom you have background checks? These people may not want a regular rotation in the nursery, yet may be willing to help when a need arises.
3. **ASK: WHAT WOULD I DO IF MY VOLUNTEERS COULD NOT BE PRESENT?** Doing this will limit the frustration and anger that sometimes accompany working with unpaid servants? It allows us to extend grace and compassion when people don't show.
4. **REMEMBER: BETTER TOGETHER.** An important part of the ethos of the church is community. Bring this into your philosophy of supporting volunteers, particularly if they do mundane tasks such as folding bulletins or mowing grass. It's more fun to work with a partner. Even the most boring task can become fun when you also build authentic relationships.

5. **DON'T FORCE YOUR PASSION.** Every leader has a passion for at least one cause. Leaders often want the congregation also to volunteer for that cause. If you cannot recruit tutors for the local school, it may be that is your passion, but not one your faith community shares. Don't force a vision that is not catching on. Find creative ways to encourage the congregation to understand the needs of the community, why tutoring is important and how they can make a difference by considering this vision. Before you begin thinking about new ministries, work with your congregation to explore your community's needs. Discover your church's calling and enhance outreach efforts by creating a church marketing plan.
6. **LEAD BY EXAMPLE.** Church Leaders need to discover their personal passion and give of themselves. Service to others is part of our United Methodist heritage. John Wesley spent his time ministering to those on the margins of society (prisoners, debtors in poorhouses, widows and those who frequented soup kitchens) and he called upon those who followed him to commit to serving the poor, a particularly important invitation since they were among the poor themselves. When pastors volunteer, we become servants. Pastors who serve in the community regularly are more understanding of and less judgmental toward those who serve as volunteers in their congregations. They go out of their way to say "thank you" and speak personally about how fulfilling it is to follow a passion and serve.

OUR CAMBODIAN FAMILY

Lately you have heard us talking about Sea and Samoeun Por, but the newer members may not know our connection to this family so Rev. Teresa has asked me to give you the background.

In the early 1980's, Lilo Burley inspired our little church to rescue a family from a Cambodian refugee camp and bring them to Chesterfield. At that time, Trinity was a much smaller country church, which sat on the edge of the courthouse property. We were struggling financially and trying to find a way to build a new building. We did not yet have the history of mission outreach that we have today. With all that being said, it surely took the working of the Holy Spirit to help Lilo convince us to take on something so radical.

In June 1982, five strangers walked off an airplane at the Richmond airport. We were only expecting four ... the process

had taken so long that Samoeun had her baby before they got here. They had their 15-year-old niece SokChea with them along with their 9-year-old son Sereyak, and now 1-year-old son Missme. The father was the only family member who spoke any English, and we certainly could not speak Khmer. They had never slept in a bed, had never had bathroom facilities or a kitchen with appliances, had never had a checking or bank account, could not drive a car, and had no worldly possessions, except the clothes on their backs and the contents of a small suitcase...they obviously would never have been able to survive in this country on their own. They were all like newborn babies, and we were suddenly in the role of adoptive parents. When we met Sea (pronounced "Sear") and Samoeun at the airport, Trinity was as nervous as you were when you brought your first baby home from the hospital.

We left the family in a home on Mason Avenue in Chester that Trinity had rented and prayed that they would be okay for their first night in America. Over time, Trinity bought them clothes, furnished their home, took them to classes in English and American culture, took them to apply for jobs and to interviews, bought them their first transportation (a bicycle that Sea rode to his first job at Hardee's and Samoeun rode to her first job at the Holiday Inn), paid for Sea's driving lessons, helped him get his driver's license, gave them their first car (from the Carneys) ... and again the story goes on and on as "our babies" grew into successful adults. This is exactly what you have done as you have raised your children and watched them grow into adulthood. It must also be noted that the entire family became U.S. citizens in 1993.

The family became totally self-sufficient and soon increased again with the arrival of twin boys, Jeffrey and Larry. The years rolled on and the children grew. SokChea graduated in two years, got married and has 4 grown children – one a dental hygienist, one in the same program at MCV, and 2 others working in the cell phone industry. Sereyak is a Marine veteran who is married and has two elementary-age children. Missme manufactures counter tops and is married to a college math professor and has one daughter and a step-son. Larry works as a painter, and Jeffrey work for a refrigeration company. We are very proud of all of them.

Sea worked as our church custodian for three years until he found a full-time job, and then Samoeun took over that job. Sea worked for 13 years as a supervisor and forklift driver in a textile mill until it closed down. Three days later he started another job with a print manufacturing company where he drove a forklift and programmed and operated robotic machines. He worked there for 13 more years until it closed down last December. He lost the family health insurance and is still currently unemployed.

Not only did the children grow older, but Mom and Dad did too. Sea remains in excellent health, but Samoeun has developed asthma and allergies which make her unable to work any longer. This is where we have come back into the picture in much the same way you would have done when your children needed you. We are currently assisting Samoeun with disability forms, helping Sea apply for jobs, assisting with Samoeun's emergency medical bills, and searching for a way to secure health care for them.

As you can see, this family became our children...not friends, not church members, not neighbors...but our children just as surely as if we had given birth to each and every one of them. This family has always been very grateful for our assistance and have "paid it forward" by helping other Cambodian families come to America and make their dreams come true.
