Unity Admits Diversity

In Jesus' last words to the Church, He commanded us to pursue diversity in the Body by taking the gospel to every ethnos (Matthew 18:22), and to Jerusalem, to the Judeans, to the Samaritans, and to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8). We are all called to be His witnesses, through whom He will call out a people unto Himself, from "every nation, from all tribes, and peoples, and languages," for the glory of

His Name (Revelation 7:9). This calling out of a people from every ethnos began as the Holy Spirit was poured out upon Jesus' disciples in Jerusalem, where people gathered from all parts of the world and heard the gospel in their own language. The result was three thousand people from around the world believing in Jesus (Acts 2).

As the Early Church was born into diversity, they initially exhibited great unity with sacrificial and humble love for one another (Acts 2: 44-46 and Acts 4: 32 - 37). This display of love and unity, as they lived their lives on mission, resulted in incredible church growth (Acts 2: 47, 4:4, 5:14, 42). In Acts 6, we see the unity of these new believers threatened as a charge of partiality was brought to the leaders of the church. The Hellenists, Greekspeaking Jews, who had come from beyond Palestine, said their widows were not receiving equal distribution of food in the daily distribution to widows. So how did they handle this threat to their unity? They empowered those who were offended, to choose seven men, full of the Spirit, to lead in the daily distribution. Seven men, mostly of Hellenistic background with Greek names, were chosen to share in leadership. This intentional sharing of leadership not only allowed the apostles to concentrate more on prayer and studying the Word, but brought integrity and unity to the Church and to all who observed. The end result of this intentional pursuit of unity, fairness, and diversity in leadership was that many of the priests even believed in Jesus and the gospel began to multiply greatly (Acts 6: 7). As they relentlessly pursued unity amidst diversity, this powerful display of the gospel and the empowerment of all the Body to join in the mission resulted in even greater effectiveness. The Church is never more effective in declaring the gospel than when we pursue unity with sacrificial love for

together

one another and when we pursue diversity in leadership.

The church in Jerusalem continued to struggle to obediently take the gospel to every ethos. God allowed persecution to break out in Jerusalem against the thousands of believers residing there, causing them to leave Jerusalem (Acts 8:1). Some of those who left eventually made their way to Antioch and began to share the gospel with every ethnos and many people be-

lieved in Jesus, both Jews and Greeks (Acts 11: 19-21). As this new church was born in Antioch, the apostles sent Barnabas to investigate. After returning to give a report to the apostles, he began to assemble a leadership team that included Paul of Tarsus to disciple the new believers (Acts 11:22-26). By no coincidence, this new church, which became the primary New Testament sending church, taking the gospel to every ethnos in Asia and Europe, had a diverse ethnic leadership team (Acts 13: 1). Through the influence of this diverse leadership team, the people displayed such sanctification in their lives that outsiders began to call them "Christians" because the way they lived and loved reminded them of Jesus (Acts 11:26). Their love for Christ and one another naturally spilled over to an expression of love for a lost world. This expression is observed as they set aside two of their best leaders to send out and spread the gospel among the Gentiles (every ethnos). As they sent out Paul and Barnabas, and eventually others, the gospel multiplied around the world (Acts 13: 2-3; 14 - 28).


Since civil rights reforms, we too have struggled with how to take the gospel to every ethos arriving in our country. The Alabama Baptist State Board of Missions Human Relationship Conference emerged from the era of civil rights reforms as a credible forum to promoting interracial dialog and understanding among residents of the state. While this forum best served its usefulness in the twentieth century, this new century demands new forums to pursue interracial unity and understanding. Two ministry challenges promote new demands: (1) New forums must address the emerging needs of the millennial generation. As their years of growth and development occur during periods of rapid multicultural advancements, new forums should consider the multicultural context of their development. (2) Due to the growth of a multicultural society, new forums should be inclusive of other people groups. The search for interracial understanding is not among African Americans and Whites alone, but new forums must pursue understanding among Hispanics, Asians, and Native Americans as well.

Today, your Alabama Baptist State Board of Missions pursues a new bold mission strategy for securing unity among a society of diverse people groups. This new strategy challenges us, as a family of believers, to impact our culture by advancing our unity. Our missional direction suggests Intentionally Moving People Across Cultures Together (IMPACT). The activity of our intentionality requires us to take the initiative to engage people in every ethnos in efforts that cause us to move beyond our cultural differences. We acknowledge that because culture generally divides us, we must discover meaningful opportunities to overcome divisions. We believe that as we learn to move through differences together, we will discover the common ground that unites us. Therefore, we seek to live out oneness with each other daily, so that those who are touched by our experiences will also learn to display Jesus' likeness of unity in their own lives. We are likewise commissioned, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to join other disciples in declaring the gospel to every ethnos in our neighborhoods, our cities, through the states in our nation, and around the globe. We will be most effective when we display the power of the gospel by pursuing unity amidst diversity with other believers, by humbly serving one another, and by sharing leadership in our local church and community with believers from every tribe, language, nation, and people group.

As men and women, whose lives already demonstrate the work of Christ and acceptance of this new direction, you are invited to attend the first annual IMPACT Leadership Conference, to be held at Shooco Springs Convention Center, April 21-23, 2016. Through your willingness to follow Christ in this pursuit, we will engage new generations of people to penetrate cultural barriers with the Gospel and win souls for Jesus Christ.


