JESUS AND RACE

One of the memorable things I did this past summer while attending the PCUSA Big Tent conference in St. Louis was to visit the Presbyterian church in Ferauson, Missouri. I guess I was most struck with how unlikely a place that community seems for such a violent set of events. It is a pleasant suburban township much like Maryville and Alcoa, though with much different histories and cultural mixes. Still, the events of August 2014 caught them as much by surprise as it did the rest of the world. Yet what I witnessed is a community taking this terrible story and making new stories, new connections, new futures from it that are not as dire nor as dangerous.

If it seems to you, as it does to me, that the issues which confront our culture are arriving faster and faster and with more, often unpleasant impact, it may be because they are. So I think it is time for us all to pause and take stock of our moment in history and see if we can discern the direction that the Holy Spirit is beckoning us to follow; see what new stories and new futures might arise out of new connections with each other where we live.

For just this purpose, Blount County United will host a forum entitled "Jesus and Race" on Saturday, January 6th in Westminster Hall here at New Providence. Anyone and everyone from our community is invited to come and explore the question "How does our faith form our beliefs and move us to action?"

We will hear from two folks, S.M. Atchley and Ron Coffin, who were students at Maryville High School when it was first integrated in 1963. We will reflect on their experiences and our own present-day situation in conversation around tables with a simple soup lunch provided by members of local churches. And we will hear a few local clergy respond to our question about faith, belief, and action.

Most of all, we hope to build community in our time together. We hope you will come, and also spread the word about this important set of conversations through all your networks. We look forward to seeing you there.

WELCOME ERIC MINTON

Hello there! I realize we haven't yet had the pleasure of meeting in person, but I thought it might be a good idea to go ahead and give a bit of an introduction into who I am, where I come from, and



where we might go together.

WHO I AM AND WHERE I COME FROM:

This is always a rather complicated question to deal with succinctly (not to mention, the nuts and bolts of my experience and education are included in my resume), but suffice it to say I'm probably a fair bit like you and a fair bit different.

For starters, my name is Eric Michael Minton and I'm a Knoxville native. Against better judgment (and a growing mountain of evidence to the contrary) I am a lifelong Tennessee football fan (being a #VFL is a lifesentence without possibility for parole). I love Cracker Barrel, spring in East Tennessee, the Smoky Mountains, Dolly Parton, and named my son Peyton Mann...just kidding about that last one.

His name is Tee Martin Minton.

I graduated from Central High School in Fountain City (home of the Litton burger and a heart-shaped pond people keep calling a "lake"). I went to the University of Tennessee and finished with an endlessly helpful degree in Psychology, married my best friend (her name's Lindsay), and moved to Los Angeles two weeks later for both of us to attend graduate school at Fuller Theological Seminary (me: in the school of theology; her: in the school of psychology).

We lived in a 420 square foot studio apartment (100 or so of those were probably just vertical blinds) for three years, and yes, it was as romantic as it sounds. We loved Southern California, but after doing a bit of soul-searching, decided to move back to a land with thunderstorms, crickets, lightnin' bugs, family, and (once again) Cracker Barrel. Roughly 6 years ago I began a stint as a students and young adults pastor at Monte Vista Baptist partnering with some amazing middle, high, and college students for 4 years. I left my position there in order to return to graduate school (yet again) at Carson Newman University for more training in family systems, counseling, psychotherapy, and human development (focusing on adolescents and emerging adults).

In the middle of that process Lindsay and I had a son, whose actual name is Finn, and professionally speaking: he's really incredible.

Upon finishing my second master's degree in clinical mental health counseling last summer, I have opened a small private practice with my wife, it's called Minton Family Therapy and we see clients (her full-time and me parttime) in a couple of different locations in West Knoxville. I also recently finished a yearlong interim position at a Baptist church in West Knoxville working with adolescents and emerging adults.

I'm now here, at the request of a few friends, to see if we might do something interesting together. I wouldn't have said yes if I didn't believe we could.

WHERE WE MIGHT GO:

I didn't have the pleasure of knowing Jason, but I can't help but know "of" someone who gave the last 5 or so years of his life to serving, partnering with, and pastoring families in a city I love.

You don't replace Jason.

You honor, celebrate, and gratefully acknowledge him and his work, and then, you try to pick up the ball and move it forward.

In my experience with addiction research and recovery communities (didn't see that transition did you!?) there is an oft-repeated phrase that serves to keep individuals and families on track to reach their goals. Occasionally, in the wake of so much work to be done, fences to be mended, and lives to be rebuilt, the overwhelming nature of it all can literally destroy any chance an addict has to stay sober. Each day, they are encouraged to greet every moment with one question: "what's the next right thing?"

This is a question that led me to Lindsay (my wife), to UT, to Los Angeles, back to East Tennessee, to Maryville, to Finn, to Carson Newman, to Central Baptist Bearden, and now here, to you, at New Providence.

I want to spend the rest of my days as a pastor, and a husband, and a dad, and a therapist asking that question, because I think it keeps me tethered to what Christians have for centuries referred to as "the Spirit."

But enough about me, I want to hear about you, and I want to do it over donuts and coffee and maybe Cracker Barrel.

Can we meet up soon?

SCOUT SUNDAY

The Boy Scouts of America annually celebrates its founding on February 8, 1910, based on the program started by Lord Baden Powell in England on August 1, 1907. Scout Sunday was added to the Scout celebration in the middle 1940s. The Scout Sunday tradition was started to make people in houses of worship aware of Scouting, and to allow Scouts to live out their "Duty to God" pledged each week. The Scout Law says that a "Scout is Reverent" and the Scouts of all ages promise to do their "Duty to God." These values strengthen youth character in their family, community and faith.

Troop 88 is the longest continuously chartered Boy Scout Troop in Blount County, receiving its original charter in October of 1935. Troop 88 is chartered to New Providence Presbyterian Church and meets on Mondays throughout the year from 7:00 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. in Westminster Fellowship Hall.

Cub Scout Pack 88 was chartered in 1940. Cub Scouting is a year-round, family-oriented part of the Boy Scouts of America program designed for boys who are in first through fifth grades.

Cub Scout Packs are organized into Dens by age and the program focuses on character development, good citizenship and to help young people become more physically fit, mentally strong and morally straight.

Troop 88 spends many hundreds of hours every year serving the community and camping in the Great Smoky Mountains. The adult leadership includes ScoutMaster John Huffman, Committee Chair Mike Teffeteller and Chartered Organizational Representative Mel Luttrell. Pack 88 meets weeknights at New Providence and is led by CubMaster Andy Luttrell & numerous Den leaders.

On Scout Sunday at New Providence, Scouts will help with ushering, readings, children's time and other worship support. All Troop 88 and Pack 88 scouts and families are invited to attend and sit together in uniform at the 11:05 service.

HEALTH TIPS

HEALTHY THOUGHTS: MENTAL HEALTH AND MENTAL DISORDERS

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jeremiah 29:11)

Mental health is essential to personal wellbeing, family and interpersonal relationships, and the ability to contribute to community or society, yet an estimated 13 million American adults (approximately 1 in 17) have a seriously debilitating mental illness.

WHAT IS MENTAL ILLNESS?

Mental disorders are among the most common causes of disability. According to National Alliance of Mental Illness, "mental illnesses are medical conditions that disrupt a person's thinking, feeling, mood, ability to relate to others and daily functioning." Just as diabetes is a disorder of the pancreas, mental illnesses are medical conditions that often result in a diminished capacity for coping with the ordinary demands of life.

Types of mental illness include major depression, schizophrenia. bipolar disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), panic disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and borderline personality disorder.

TREATMENT FOR MENTAL ILLNESS

Mental illnesses are both manageable and treatable. In fact, most people diagnosed with a serious mental illness can experience relief from their symptoms by actively participating in an individual treatment plan. Treatments include medication, psychosocial treatment (such as cognitive behavioral therapy), interpersonal therapy, and peer support groups.

IMPORTANT FACTS

Mental illnesses are serious medical illnesses. They can affect persons of any race, religion, educational background, or income, and are not the result of personal weakness, lack of character, or poor upbringing. They cannot be overcome through "will power" or "tough love." Mental illness usually affects individuals in the prime of their lives, often during adolescence and young adulthood. All ages are susceptible, but the young and the old are especially vulnerable.

Early identification and treatment is of vital importance; by ensuring access to the treatment and recovery supports that are proven effective, recovery is accelerated and the further harm related to the course of illness is minimized.

For adult readers there are three new books that are must reads. Two are by Timothy B. Tyson. His first, *Blood Done Sign My Name*, is a riveting narrative of the summer of 1970 in Oxford, North Carolina. This personal

account by Tyson is a portrait of what has been described as a uniquely American struggle for racial equality and the swirls of emotion around it. Tyson's latest book is The Blood of Emmett Till. This is the account of the fourteen-year-old from Chicago whose murder was a part of a wave of white terrorism that became the foundation of the modern civil rights movement. The book has been praised as "upending what we thought we knew about the most notorious racial crime in American history." The final book we are featuring is the National Book Award winner Between the World and Me by Ta-Nehisi Coates. This book is a letter from Coates to his adolescent son about inhabiting a black body and finding a way to live with it. I found this book to be one of the most helpful accounts of our current racial conflicts that I have read. I truly believe it should be required reading for all of us.

When you are inside on cold January days, spend some time with these books and others that you can find in the NPPC Resource Center. Remember these featured books are on the table inside the door, and others are listed in the notebook on the circulation shelf.
