FROM THE PASTOR

In 1995, Marj Carpenter, a ruling elder from the metropolis of Big Spring, Texas, was elected moderator of the General Assembly of the PC(USA). She

was a tireless advocate for mission, and she was often quoted as saying, "I am sinfully proud to be a Presbyterian." She went on to say, "It's a sin to be proud but we don't waste that one much. When

anybody asks what church we attend, we drop our heads and sheepishly say, 'Presbyterian.' But there are 90 million people out there in more than 120 countries who are very proud of being Presbyterian and Reformed, and we helped put them there."

This month, right here in our own corner of God's kingdom, I couldn't agree more. I am sinfully proud to be Presbyterian. After the November 28th fires that devastated Gatlinburg, Presbyterians were among the first on the scene. In recent years, the Gatlinburg Presbyterian Church has converted unused Christian Education space into a retreat center, which they immediately turned over to All Hands Volunteers, a national disaster recovery team that has been asked by the state government to coordinate efforts in Sevier County. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) will be onsite by late January, and will stay until recovery efforts are complete. The Bethel Presbyterian Church in Kingston is working with a United Methodist congregation in Gatlinburg composed almost entirely of Spanish-speaking immigrants. Many, many Presbyterians and other people of faith are urging city and county governments to take this opportunity to address the need for decent public housing for the untold numbers of hourly workers (hotel and retail clerks, landscapers, cleaning personnel and the like) who keep Sevier County's tourist business running, and who now are among the most vulnerable.

And I should add that I am sinfully proud to be a New Providence Presbyterian as well. The New Providence Men's group immediately responded to the crisis with \$3000 (made through their football parking enterprise) to be split among the Red Cross, the Presbytery of East Tennessee Disaster Relief Fund, and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. The Welcome Table has offered to provide meals which other members will be delivering to

> volunteers on Tuesday nights through the end of January. There was so much interest in helping that other NewProv members have stepped up to take on five more nights. One of our

Geneva groups will provide a meal next Thursday (great idea, by the way!) Two of our members have graciously driven All Hands Staff to the Nashville airport

On top of that, donations totaling almost \$22,000 have already been received locally to help with disaster relief efforts. \$6400 of that came from New Providence, but help has also arrived from Presbyterians in Ohio and Virginia, from churches stretched from Allardt to DC, from the Presbytery of Tropical Florida and even a Presbyterian Women's group in upstate New York. Yes, indeed, I am sinfully proud to be Presbyterian.

Some of you know that I have agreed to co-chair the Presbytery's Disaster Response team with Gradye Parsons, and as time goes on, I know that there will be many, many more ways to serve, but I am grateful to see your generous response already.

Steve and I have worked together for a long time, and we don't agree about everything, but we do agree on this: the Church of Jesus Christ exists as least as much for those outside its wall as it does for those inside the walls. Thank you for demonstrating that one more time.

It is a joy to be the church with you!

HEALTH TIPS

Make 2017 an active year! With the start of a New Year, many people make resolutions to get healthy. A big part to getting and/or staying healthy is being active. Check out these tips:

BEFORE YOU START... If you have a health problem like heart disease, diabetes, or obesity, talk with your doctor about the types and amounts of physical activity that are right for you.

Aim for 2 hours and 30 minutes a week of moderate aerobic activities:

- If you were not exercising before, start slowly. Begin with 10 minutes of aerobic activity and build up to doing 30 minutes at a time.
- Aim for 30 minutes of aerobic activity on most days of the week.
- Choose aerobic activities that make your heart beat faster like walking fast, dancing, swimming, or raking leaves.
- Tell your doctor if you have shortness of breath, chest pain, or unplanned weight loss.

Do strengthening activities 2 days a week:

- Try using exercise bands of lifting hand weights. You can also use bottles of water or cans of food as weights.
- Breathe out as you lift the weight, and breathe in as you lower it. Do not hold your breath - holding your breath can cause unsafe changes in your blood pressure.

Do balance activities 3 or more days a week:

- Practice standing on one foot (hold onto a chair if you need to at first).
- Stand up form a sitting position without using your hands.
- Learn tai chi ("ty chee"), a Chinese mind-body exercise that involves moving the body slowly and gently.
- Sign up for a yoga class, or try following a yoga video at home.

GATLINBURG WILDFIRE RELIEF

The wildfires that hit Gatlinburg and Sevier County took mere minutes to cause devastation. The recovery, however, will take at least two years. The Presbytery of East Tennessee's Disaster Response Team is working in concert with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) and other organizations to help for the duration. Each month we will have an update in the *New Prov Press*, in the bulletins and on our website at www. newprovidencepres.org for you and ways you can be involved.

What to know if you want to help in person (individual or group):

- Every volunteer must register initially through the Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) at 1304 Parkway in Sevierville.
- Only authorized groups will be allowed to participate in recovery efforts. The Sevier County Emergency Manager has determined that all recovery work (both needs of residents and offers of volunteer work) will go through the VRC. The county does not want individuals or groups soliciting work sites apart from the VRC.
- Because of the current nature of fire recovery, most volunteers are being used to sort donations. Work-site activity involves sifting and demolition. Precautions are being taken regarding exposure to potentially toxic debris.
- Churches in the presbytery are signing up to prepare meals for the volunteers with the All Hands organization, which is being housed at the Gatlinburg Presbyterian Church. New Providence will cover all the Tuesdays through January with food from the Welcome Table, but we have also signed up for some additional dates: 12/29, 1/7, 1/13, 1/19, and 1/22. This is an easy task for a Sunday school class, Geneva group, or even just a couple of families or individuals. Go to the Sign up Genius page to sign up to help with these meals. If you'd like to pick an alternate date, these are available at https://mealtrain. com/2l5wd7. Or, if you'd prefer

not to cook, consider catering a meal from one of Gatlinburg's restaurants. That helps local business owners and employees as well! Click here for the link to the MealTrain sign up for this project.

Monetary donations continue to be needed. Congregations and individuals are encouraged to donate to the Presbytery's Disaster Relief fund.

STAINED GLASS WINDOW SERIES

Almost without exception, every person who steps into our sanctuary for the first time comments about the beautiful stained glass windows, in fact, so much so that I plan to preach a winter/spring sermon series about those windows.

Have you ever wondered who all those people were? I can tell you about the characters in the windows themselves, but I'm intrigued by the selections. For instance, this is the only church I know that has a "Mary Magdalene" window, since Mary Magdalene has historically (and wrongly) been considered one of the "bad girls of the Bible." If you have any information – anecdotal or otherwise – about why these 11 characters were chosen, I'd love to hear it.

I'm also very interested in finding out the history of the people in whose names they were dedicated. I don't know anything about the LeQuire family, but I'll bet someone in this congregation does! What follows is the information we have collected over the years. If you know more details that could be added to any of these descriptions, would you email me at Emily@newprovidencepres.org? I would be most grateful.

- of: Dr. and Mrs. Samuel Tyndale
 Wilson. Dr. Samuel Tyndale Wilson,
 fifth president of Maryville College
 served twenty-nine years from 19011930. Dr. and Mrs. Wilson and their
 six children lived for many years at
 Willard House on the campus, all
 active in the church and college
 activities. Miss Lois Wilson continues
 to live in Maryville after serving 40
 years as a missionary in Lebanon.
- Knox Window In memory of: Lilly Elizabeth Koella. Living in Basel, Switzerland, and a member of the Reformed Protestant Church, she was educated in Switzerland and England. A frequent visitor to her brother, Ernest Koella, Sr., founder of the Rockford Manufacturing Company, one of her last gestures of good will toward this country was befriending American G.I.s stationed in Basel in WWII.
- Paul Window In memory of: Mark Blaine Crum. Graduated from Maryville College in 1917, and a major in the National Guard, he was seriously wounded in WWI. Upon recovery and marrying Margaret Buxton, he established the Crum Insurance Agency here. The father of a daughter, Peggy Crum Crosby, he served as a deacon and an elder of New Providence.
- Stephen Window In memory of:
 Oscar Rankin Proffitt, son of Mr.
 and Mrs. Charles C. Proffitt, brother
 of Charlotte Proffitt Paxton and
 Walter Proffitt. Not subject to the
 draft in WWII because of childhood
 polio, he volunteered for the air
 force while a student at Maryville
 College. He was killed February 24,
 1944, when flying out of Italy over
 northern Yugoslavia as a navigator
 in a B-17 (Flying Fortress).

- Mary Magdalene Window In memory of: Benjamin Horace Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. T.H. Brown, Sr., brother of Mary Brown Smith and T.H. Brown, Jr. He was a graduate of Maryville College and Duke University Law School. After army demobilization, he was killed on February 17, 1946, when flying with a friend over the family farm.
- Chancel Window In memory of: The Reverend Thomas A. Graham, D.D. Born in Airdie, Scotland, in 1903, "Tommy" migrated to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in 1923. There he found employment and, on June 1, 1927, married Marion "Masie" Rowan. He worked his way through Carroll College during the great depression, served as pastor of two small churches and as director of a church choir in Milwaukee. He was called to New Providence in January of 1945. A gifted oratorical preacher, he gave much time to counseling college students and to our three mission churches in addition to his pastoral duties. Working closely with the building committee for the new church, he planned and designed the stained glass windows which greatly helped the craftsmen who constructed them. Upon his premature death on November 28, 1952, before the completion of the building, the congregation gave the chancel window in his memory.
- Abraham Window In memory of: Members and Marshall Magill Family. The Reverend and Mrs. Charles Magill, missionaries to the Philippines for 40 years (1905-1945), both of whom died in concentration camps, he just four days before liberation. Jessie Magill Jones and her husband, the Reverend Robert Jones, served as missionaries to Siam for 20 years (1899-1919). Harriet ("Hattie") Magill McIlvaine and her husband Joseph J. McIlvaine, a native Irishman and Blount County farmer.
- Moses Window In memory of: Our Founders. The Reverend Gideon Blackburn, D.D., was our first minister serving from 1792-1810. At the same time he served Eusebia Church and was the first

missionary to the Cherokee Indians. He established numerous schools and churches, including Blackburn College, Carlinville, Illinois.

The Reverend Isaac Anderson, D.D., succeeded Dr. Blackburn in 1812 at age 32 and remained here for the rest of his life. He saw the church grow from 209, the year he came, to 788 in 1835. He preached as many as 200 sermons a year while also serving as President of Maryville College which he founded in 1819.

- David Window In memory of:
 N.W. Proffitt and his wife Alice.
 In 1899 Nicholas ("Nick") Proffitt,
 a farmer, came by wagon, -his
 wife and five children by train to
 Blount County seeking educational
 advantages offered by Maryville
 College. A sixth child, David Wilson
 Proffitt, was born on the farm they
 acquired west of town. Later all
 six children were educated at the
 college and they, and twenty-three
 grandchildren became members of
 New Providence.
- Elijah Window In memory of Eleanor Brickey LeQuire. Born May 24, 1885, at Tuckaleechee, she married G.D. LeQuire, M.D. in 1906. Among her outstanding qualities was the ability to listen, whether the content of the conversation was good or bad, and then follow up with genuine helpfulness, spiced with a great sense of humor. The Epitome of the Biblical "Helpmeet", she is said to have operated Blount

County's first answering service. Her artistry and humor were reflected by the caricatures she drew of the famous (and not so famous). Eleanor B. LeQuire died in 1948 leaving her husband; sons Dr. C.B. LeQuire, Paul D. LeQuire, Dr. V.S. LeQuire; and daughters Faye L. Kenst and Reba L. McCrosky.

- Isaiah Window In memory of: Fred Lowery Proffitt. He and his wife, Estelle Snodgrass, were teachers in the preparatory department at the college. Elected college treasurer and recorder of the directors in 1914, he held the position until his death in 1943. The father of three daughters, Louise (Mrs. Wayne F.) Haviland, Ruth (Mrs. William F.) MacCalmont, and Grace (Mrs. David L.) McArthur. He was building committee chairman of the church annex 1913-1916, superintendent of the church school, and elder.
- The Rose Window In memory of: James and Lula Harrison Callaway whose children were Anna Bell, Elizabeth, Henry, Joe, Lavinia Lea, Lula, and Thomas.
