WHY I LOVE THE MAUNDY THURSDAY SERVICE

Easter at New Providence is wonderful! The sun streams through the stained glass windows (hopefully!), the children are dressed in their Sunday best, the congregation responds, "He is risen indeed!" after hearing Emily announce, "Christ is risen!", Peggy pulls out all the stops with the organ, we hear the word proclaimed, and we all go home filled with the knowledge that everything is right with the world once again. It's all perfect, it really is.

But for me, being properly prepared for Easter Sunday includes being acutely aware of what came before Resurrection Day. Palm Sunday starts with Jesus' joyous entry into Jerusalem, but ends with the knowledge that the crowd is turning against him. Maundy Thursday makes that sad truth palpable.

Our Maundy Thursday service is dark and solemn and, like nothing else I've experienced, makes the sorrow of Jesus' last night on earth real. We share his last meal on earth, we hear his last words to his disciples, and we feel the agony of what he is facing. The final scripture reading, the stripping of the chancel, the closing of the book, and leaving the sanctuary in darkness and silence, all serve to show us, in a literal, physical way, what Jesus freely agreed to undergo for us.

And that darkness, that sadness, makes the joy of Easter mean so much more! If you haven't yet found your way to our Maundy Thursday service, I urge you to put it on your Lenten calendar. I am confident that, like so many of us already do, you will find it a reminder of the sacrifice that was made for us, and a precursor to an even more meaningful and jubilant Easter morning.

GREETINGS FROM YOUR SESSION!

Historically, New Providence has conducted a spring stewardship campaign asking members of the congregation to make a pledge that indicates their anticipated annual giving. We then take those numbers into the budgeting cycle to match income to expenses.

This year we want to do things differently. After much study and discussion, the NPPC session has decided to modify the process by moving our stewardship drive to the fall, while maintaining a July to June budget year.

We have several reasons for a shift:

- calendar year giving simplifies reporting for members;
- stewardship is about responding to God, not a budget; and
- we have every reason to believe that NPPC members will continue to faithfully step up to meet the financial needs for our congregation's mission and ministries.

This will be a transitional year into the new process. The 2019-20 budget will be generated and go into effect July 1, 2019, *before* pledges are received in Fall 2019. During this transition time, we are asking each of you to continue giving at least at your current level, if not greater.

- Previous Cycle
 - Spring: Individuals pledge annual giving
 - Spring/Summer: Budget is prepared, session votes to approve
 - Fiscal Year: July 1-June 30
- New Cycle
 - Fall: Individuals pledge annual giving
 - Spring/Summer: Budget is prepared, session votes to approve
 - Fiscal Year: July 1-June 30

PC(USA) UPDATE ON IMMIGRATION

On February 28, Teresa Waggener from the PC(USA) Office of Immigration Issues led a discussion at Fountain City Presbyterian Church with ministers and staff leaders from the Presbytery of East Tennessee on our denomination's response to immigration. Teresa's work includes advising presbyteries and congregations that are calling immigrant pastors. She helps Presbyterians understand and challenge injustices within the country's complex system by taking immigration law and policy and breaking it down into resources that tell the stories of those affected. Teresa brings a rich background to her current position: a law degree, a Masters in Spirituality, and previous work as a public defender, attorney for child protective services, and an immigration attorney for Kentucky Refugee Ministries.

Teresa shared what is taking place within and outside of the United States, including various kinds of actions churches throughout the country are taking.

WITHIN THE U.S.

There are 11 million undocumented people within the U.S. Prior to 2017, the government used prosecutorial discretion in more lenient ways, allowing immigrants to stay in the country, as long as they lived as good citizens and were an asset to their communities. More recently, immigrant neighbors are being sent to ICE (Immigration & Customs Enforcement) and then deported, some after having lived within the U.S. for 20 years.

OUTSIDE THE U.S.

This year, 30,000 people are being allowed to emigrate to the U.S. This number is lower than in previous years, even though there is a worldwide refugee problem. One definition of a refugee is a person who is being persecuted or fears persecution in their country because of race, nationality, faith, membership in a particular social group, or political opinion. These refugees generally leave their countries and wait in another country while a decision is being made about their

entry into the U.S. Other refugees are asylum seekers – generally people from our own hemisphere who present themselves at the border and ask for asylum based on reasons listed above. Persons have to be in the U.S. to ask for asylum; that is, they cross the border and present themselves to authorities, and the immigration process begins. Currently, immigration officers are stepping across the border into Mexico and are not allowing asylum seekers onto U.S. land. Thousands of homeless people are now at the border.

WHAT ARE PRESBYTERIANS DOING?

Many PC(USA) congregations have made alliances with other denominations and developed ways to make an impact. Some show up at ICE to pray and sing. Some initiate a Jericho walk — walking around immigration offices seven times, singing and praying as they walk. Others are assisting immigrants with efforts to connect with their families already in the U.S. Some churches are working with churches in Mexico, and others have set up temporary shelters.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

- Start conversations about immigration.
- Engage in Bible study about immigrants.
- Provide a place where people can hear one another.

Immigration has become an important concern for many Americans, as we see in the conversations around issues like building a wall on the Mexico border, DREAMERS and DACA recipients. And the questions are complex: Should children of immigrants be granted citizenship? Should there be a ban on immigration from Muslim countries? What about sanctuary cities?

There is much work to be done. May we prayerfully discern our role in this crisis.

HEALTH TIPS

DID YOU KNOW?

Before the modern era, people used some of these mixtures to clean their teeth; powders made from ashes, eggshells and pumice; ground chalk or charcoal; tobacco and honey mixture; powder of burnt bread mixed with soap.

100 years ago, few people had a daily habit of brushing their teeth. Concerned about rotting teeth of soldiers, the US Army provided toothbrushes and toothpaste during World War II. Later, a Pepsodent ad campaign appealed to the masses by promising a brighter smile, and the habit took hold.

47% of adults aged 30 years and older have some form of gum disease.

And even higher 70% of adults 65 years and older suffer from gum disease.

Researchers are studying a link between gum disease and heart disease.

Another area of study is an association between gum disease and early labor and low birth weights.

Protecting your smile could have long-lasting benefits for your overall health.

THE ROOT OF DENTAL CARE

Healthy teeth and gums count for more than a pretty smile in pictures. Regular brushing, flossing, and trips to the dentist help prevent both cavities and serious gum disease.

- Brush your best!
- Use a brush with soft bristles to avoid harm to your gums.
- Aim for 30 seconds in each quadrant in your mouth for a total of two minutes.
- Brush at least twice a day. Make sure one time is before you go to bed.
- Use a toothpaste with fluoride for the best protection against plaque and tartar build-up.
- Remember to brush your tongue -bacteria live on your tongue as well as on your teeth.

- Floss! It's just as important as brushing and most effective just before bed.
- Be sure to change your toothbrush every two to three months.
- Visit the dentist regularly for checkups and cleanings.
- Finally, try to eat and drink fewer sugary foods. A healthy diet means healthy teeth and gums.
