FROM THE PASTOR

"As the Lord your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug..."

Those words come from the widow of Zarephath

of Zarepnatr in the book of I Kings, one of the Old Testament books that tells the history of Israel, and in particular, the ministry of the prophet Elijah.

Instead of a crisis, may we see this as an opportunity to hone our priorities, trust in God's faithfulness, and challenge ourselves to be more generous and faithful as well.

That's a long and complicated story, but when we finally meet Elijah in I Kings 17, he and his neighbors are in the midst of a drought. In the small village of Zarephath, he encounters a widow gathering sticks, and asks for bread and water. She has none, since the area has suffered this drought for many years.

But she has a little grain, she admits, and a little oil in a jar. She tells Elijah that she's been saving it to fix one last meal for herself and her son, and that then they will die. You know what comes next – Elijah asks her to fix him a meal, and no sooner does she than the canisters of grain and oil are filled over and over again.

While I am wary of imposing Biblical texts onto current situations, that story speaks to me about where our church and its leaders (myself included) find ourselves today. New Providence is no newcomer to need or privation. Charter members survived inside the walls of Craig's Fort in 1786. The Civil War nearly decimated this congregation. Like many churches, we have weathered our share of conflicts and divisions.

But Zarephath gives us a hint to what's ahead. When Elijah arrives on the scene, this widow has exhausted all her possible resources. There are no more packets of ramen noodles, nor blue boxes of mac & cheese.

The widow and her son didn't get there overnight. There had to have been years of belt-tightening and coupon-clipping. No matter how meticulous their spending, they had come to the end of their resources.

I tell that story only as a preface to where we at New Providence find ourselves today. While ministries are

growing, and opportunities are all around us, the difficult reality is that all of those ministries cost money, and in recent years, giving to NPPC has not kept pace

with our expenses. The bottom line is that we are not bringing in all the money we need. And any of us who manage household or personal budgets understand that that is not sustainable.

For several years, we've had the benefit of a "cushion" of reserve funds. But this year, those monies are no longer available. We finished the 2016-2017 year with a nearly \$100,000 deficit. That is not a matter of overspending – to the contrary, our expenses came in almost \$50,000 under budget. But our income has not been what we anticipated. The jars of oil and grain are nearly empty.

The elders whom you elected to serve this congregation take seriously their responsibility to be fiscally responsible in confirming a balanced budget for our life and ministry together. Continuing to end fiscal years in the red is simply not sustainable. That means that all of our ministry areas have been asked to cut 12% from last year's actual spending, in order to insure that the 2017-2018 fiscal year ends in the black.

I hope you know that none of these decisions have come easily; nor have they been made without long and prayerful consideration. It is painful to think about which of our important ministries might suffer because of this shortfall, but in the interest of financial integrity, your leaders feel it is critical.

Maybe you are asking, "What can I do?" First, and most importantly, please pray. Pray for God's wisdom as your

leaders seek to understand exactly where God is leading us. And secondly, if you are able, please give. No gift is unimportant, and every dollar makes a difference. Last, but not least of all, please keep your eyes open to see God at work around us. Instead of a crisis, may we see this as an opportunity to hone our priorities, trust in God's faithfulness, and challenge ourselves to be more generous and faithful as well.

I'm sure that you have questions, and I will do my best to answer them, as will members of session. Our annual meeting will be on August 27; annual reports and budget information will be available beginning August 20. On Tuesday night, August 22, we will hold a budget forum in Eastminster Hall at 7:00 p.m. That is the best venue in which to ask specific questions about the budget itself, and I hope you will make plans to be there.

I look forward to celebrating with you at our annual meeting and lunch the following Sunday, August 27th.

It is a joy to be the church with you!

YOUTH EDUCATION KICKS OFF

Although the kids don't want to admit it, summer is quickly coming to a close and fall programming is upon us! In the youth department that means that we have a lot of new things going on and I hope we see many of you here! We have two youth groups here at New Providence; iGroup for 6th-8th grades and PYC for 9th-12th grades. We meet on Sunday nights at 4:30 for iGroup, eat dinner all together at 6pm, and then the PYC kids stay from 6:30 to 8. These Sunday nights consist of games, discussion, bible study, and taking a look at how our faith can and should affect our lives. We always have a blast. We meet in the youth room across from the glass doors in the connector hallway.

On Sunday mornings we will have two Sunday school classes for our youth age kids. PYC will meet in the youth room and we will use a curriculum called Messy Stories from the Old Testament The last few years we have been alternating back and forth between New Testament and Old Testament focused curriculum, and I think this one will be both informative and enjoyable for our youth. Our iGroup kids will use Feasting On The Word. This is a lectionary based curriculum, which means that it follows the three year schedule of scripture called the Revised Common Lectionary. This schedule of scriptures gives a starting place for most of the preaching at New Providence, and so by using a Sunday school curriculum that follows it as well, the kids get a chance to unpack those scriptures a little further, and reinforce what they hear in church.

This year we will also continue our Fifth Sunday Family nights. On months with five Sundays, we invite parents to join us for youth programming and dinner. This gives us a chance to increase family involvement, and gives parents a look at what a "typical" Sunday night entails for our youth.

MAN OF THE YEAR

BUD GANGWER NAMED NEW PROVIDENCE MAN OF THE YEAR

Bud Gangwer is selected as New Providence Man of the year because of his exceptional service to the church. his activities related to the men of the church and his service to the community.

Bud was born in Mississippi in 1940. He is the youngest of 4 children. He had twin sisters, Ethel and Catherine, 12 years older and another sister Mary Sue, 9 years older. He soon moved to Madisonville, where he graduated from high school. During this time he was a member of First Presbyterian Church in Madisonville.

He attended the University of Tennessee and received a degree in Political Science. After graduation, he served as a special agent in the Army in Germany. After the army, he served as a member of the Joint Legislative Services of the Tennessee Legislature in Nashville. Prior to retiring after 37 years, he served as the Director of Legislative Services. While in Nashville he would come home on weekends and care for his mother until her death. He remained a member of First Presbyterian of Madisonville until his mother died. At that time he joined Second Presbyterian in Nashville.

WHY I AM GOING TO GUATEMALA

I spent the summer of 1970 as an exchange student in Ecuador. At that time, and probably today, 2% of the population held 90% of the wealth. Only the 2% could consider hosting an exchange student. I saw firsthand what that statistic meant! Some of the images remain among the most vivid of my high school years. The family I lived with was a good family - caring, outgoing; I had the time of my life. It was no more their fault that they were wealthy than it is the fault of the 98% that they are poor. Still, the dramatic difference haunts me today when I think about it.

The first day I arrived I changed clothes and found my old clothes gone a few minutes later. Two hours later, I found them washed, neatly folded sitting on my bed. I was shown the button on the wall to call the live-in maids. YES, maids. There were two-one to cook and one to clean. My family owned a BVD shirt business and the factory where the clothing was made. The workers were paid daily in cash slightly more than my daily allowance for fun stuff.

We lived in Guayaquil, the coastal city. It was packed with apartment buildings bulging with way too many families. On the outskirts the people lived in grass huts. The home of my family and friends were villas. EVERY Sunday afternoon and evening, when all the maids had their ½ day off, there was a large (50 people or more) party at one of the homes. All the homes were more than large enough to host these parties. Please understand that these people were wonderful, caring people. This was the culture they were born into and the life they appreciated but took for granted, just as young children today don't understand a life without cell phones.

I wondered then and off and on throughout my life what I should have been able to do about the situation. From that experience as a sophomore in high school, I believe I know what to expect when I arrive in Guatemala. I know we won't be changing the fundamental social culture in one week. I will be giving one short week to help out.
