YOUTH UPDATE

EAT TOGETHER, STAY TOGETHER

Researchers from my alma mater (Fuller Theological Seminary), as well as a diverse coterie of scholars, sociologists, educators, and policy

wonks across the educational, theological, and professional spectrum have noted that the one predictable factor in increased wellbeing measures for adolescents and emerging adults is the presence of at least 5 non-parental, intergenerational adult relationships. These scholars

note that churches are often places where adolescents and emerging adults are most likely to find opportunity to generate just these kinds of relationships, and as faith communities grapple with their place in our changing religious landscape, an institution-wide focus on intergenerational relationships between adolescents and older adults can be an important seedbed for renewed church health (or at least decreased institutional anxiety).

Everyone (especially churches) benefits from spending time with people from different generational, sociological, ethnic, and occupational cohorts, the more, the better actually. From decreased polarization, politicization, and isolation, to the emergence of new ideas, new ways of being, and new possibilities, the opportunities are literally endless for churches willing to find new ways

to connect people from different communities in shared mission and worship.

While engaging in these kinds of cross-generational friendships can be rather daunting for many of us, there are easy ways here at New Providence to meet someone new: from

> volunteering at the Welcome Table, to sitting somewhere different in worship (with the intent of speaking to someone you're just meeting), and even to joining our student ministry on Sunday evenings when Middle School and High School students, as well as a few adults join together for a shared meal at 6:00

p.m. Just this past Sunday, the Disciples Sunday School class served (and ate alongside!) our student ministry, during which both groups discovered not only a shared love of baked potatoes and REAL bacon crumbles, but also that the people we often see and rarely speak to on Sunday mornings have life experiences, passions, dreams, and interests that are rather similar to our own. One adult member of the Disciples class even went so far to say: "That was so much fun, every group in our church should host our kids for dinner!"

Who knows what might emerge for you when you engage a student or senior adult or a young family in conversation over dinner, lunch, coffee, or in the church bus on the way to serve our community. However, the first step is always the most difficult, so instead of feeling overwhelmed (maybe you can't

host our student ministry for dinner), one easy thing you can do is to ask: "How can I make space for students (or senior adults or young families) in the work I'm most passionate about here at New Providence?"

The answers (and the people who join in) just might surprise you!

Early in this year, I asked several individuals to work with me to design a visioning process for our congregation

as we carefully and prayerfully work to discern what God is calling New Providence to do and be in the next chapter of our life together.

The five people I invited to participate are not the have asked, but each of them brought particular strengths to the table:

Tyler Johnson is a team builder, Chrissy Irvine is a project manager and process leader, John Pittenger is the perceptive sage with many years in this congregation, and better gut instincts than most of us could ever hope for. Wes King is the innovator, and Carrie Eaton – as you know if you've ever worked with her - is the person who can get the wheels on the bus, and get the bus moving down the road.

As I said, they're not the only group of people who could do this, but they each have special skills that have been invaluable in crafting and carrying out this process.

Their work led us to summer listening groups to get input from the congregation, and we are currently distilling that data into workable themes. The next step will be to identify goals, which will then turn into action plans.

Many of you have been a part of that already. Listening groups, led by session members, have given us valuable input about what your hopes and dreams are for this congregation.

Currently, in addition to the visioning team's own examination of the data, Dr. Tricia Bruce at Maryville College is tackling our recordings and notes of listening sessions with one of her upperlevel sociology classes. They will help us by performing qualitative data analysis of our information; we in turn help them by giving them hands-on practice in the

> field in which these students are hoping to work.

The next step will happen over the weekend of November 3-4. On Saturday morning and again on Sunday afternoon, incoming and current deacons and elders at only five I could Trust that meaningful conversations New Providence will meet for a 2-day retreat with Dr. Laurie -Margaret Wheatley Ferguson. Using a design technique

called the "Odyssey Process" from the Stanford Design School, officers will look at the themes distilled from information gathering, consider possibilities, and choose a path for moving forward. These are your elected leaders, and I trust them to have the very best at heart for this congregation. They (and I) will want to keep you in the loop as the process unfolds.

That's just the big picture, of course. Following that, implementation teams will get to work to determine exactly how to reach those goals and what steps we'll need to put in place.

All in all, is it a lot of work? YOU BET. Is it important work? YOU KNOW IT. One of the historic principles of Presbyterian governance is that all of us do better work than one or a few of us. So I'm looking forward to seeing what ALL of us come up with together.

Because it is difficult to plan wisely during the emotional stress of death, the Session of New Providence continues to encourage members to discuss and plan in advance for Christian options and arrangements that are necessary at the time of death. These plans should be simple and meaningful, provide spiritual comfort, bear witness to our resurrection hope, and be such that the Christian community and its support may be central. HEALTH TIPS

GETTING STARTED WITH MINDFULNESS

Mindfulness practices bring many benefits but do not have to be overwhelming. Like many habits, the more we practice, the better we get, but we don't have to be experts before we can start. Here are some ideas for getting started with mindfulness in small doses in a variety of ways until you hit your stride.

- Mindful Mornings. Are you aware of how you start the day? Even before you get out of bed, take some deep breaths, use a favorite centering prayer, or pause to be aware of how the various parts of your body feel.
- Working Ways. When you sit in your chair, let yourself feel your body come into contact with the chair, the floor, the desk, or other physical tools of your profession. Draw a breath and let it out slowly before moving on to be physically present to another dimension of your space before being lost in the rush of tasks.
- The Best Intentions. We all have things we have to do every day that consume most of our time. It only takes a second to choose something that we want to be today kind, calm, patient. What value is on your heart that you want to embrace in this moment?
- Noticing Senses. Try using a sense you don't usually focus on. Close your eyes and listen. Stop moving and be still. Inhale deeply the fragrances around you. Touch a new texture. In that moment, what is that sense of discovery like?
- All the Feels. We do so much on auto-pilot, from small tasks like brushing our teeth to important tasks like how we fuel our bodies or have conversations. For one minute, turn off auto-pilot. What does it feel like to brush your teeth? To scratch the dog's chin? To inhale clean laundry?
- The Real Truth. When you have a self-deprecating thought, nip the rumination in the bud by speaking truth out loud. Say something

- positive and admirable about yourself, take a deep breath, and sit with the truth for a moment before moving on.
- Flickering Flames. Light a candle and simply watch it flicker and dance. Let the simple movement of the light calm you. You are not trying to think about anything or accomplish anything, but simply notice.
- Ritual Richness. Your own miniceremony for anything from how you prepare your tea to clearing your desk and your mind at the end of the day can create calming space for you to better manage stress in your life.
- Cool Spots. Choose a spot where you can be alone for five minutes, even in the midst of a group of people, such as on a bus or subway ride. Anywhere you can close your eyes, breathe intentionally, and observe your senses will help reduce stress.
