

Welcome

Reformation 500

We are gathering together for this worship service as a part of our celebration of the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Lutheran Reformation. This joyful occasion provides a wonderful opportunity to worship God in a larger setting than our regular worship services. It also allows us to make use of the skills and talents of many in our churches to play and prepare music together that would be difficult for each of the congregations to do on their own.

The 95 Theses

The event that is generally recognized as the start of the Lutheran Reformation occurred on October 31, 1517. On that day, Luther posted his 95 Theses concerning indulgences on the door of Wittenberg's Castle Church. Indulgences were sold in many areas of the Holy Roman Empire (including much of present-day Germany) with the promise that they would forgive the temporal punishment of sin. Many people bought indulgences believing that this was the best way to deal with their sins and to satisfy God the angry judge.

Luther felt that many sellers of indulgences were not being careful enough about what they preached and taught. He assumed, incorrectly, that the Pope and other church leaders were unaware of these abuses.

Luther eventually realized that the sale of indulgences was just a symptom of a much deeper problem in the Roman Catholic Church, one that obscured God's grace, his undeserved love for people. But in 1517, Luther still viewed himself as a faithful Roman Catholic, loyal to the Pope and to the doctrine he had learned as he grew up. The 95 Theses that Luther posted, therefore, contain some examples of false teaching, including a belief in purgatory.

At the same time, Luther's understanding of the Scripture had already led him to some conclusions about the importance of true repentance and faith, realizations that would help him rescue the truth of the Bible from the errors that had been imposed on it. For this reason, we will speak several of the individual theses during the confession and absolution portion of our service this morning.

Holy Communion

Our service includes the celebration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion. In keeping with the Bible's teachings and historic practice, WELS churches practice "member communion," also known as close communion or closed communion. Any guests at our service who are not members of a WELS church are invited to learn more about both the sacrament and our practice from any of the pastors, but are asked to kindly refrain from communing at this time.

Offering

Our guests should also not feel compelled to give an offering. The members of each of our churches have indicated a desire to financially support the work of the churches. Please note that offerings in envelopes will be delivered to the church marked on the envelope (blank envelopes are available from the ushers if needed). Loose offerings will be divided among the congregations.

Children's Choir

The children singing with the choir this morning are asked to sit with their families during the concert. Please assemble at the front of the auditorium during the final piece. Children will return to their families after their song is done.

Please enter and exit the auditorium as necessary during the concert; however please refrain from talking.

This hymn, written by Martin Luther, is a paraphrase of Psalm 46. Minister: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Congregation: Amen.

CONFESSION OF SINS

M: Today we celebrate that God has preserved for us the pure teaching of his Word. We remember the bold confessions and active faith of Martin Luther and others through whom God accomplished many great things. We commemorate the first clear movements away from false teaching and toward a pure proclamation of the gospel in the posting of the 95 Theses. We acknowledge that God's Word has not changed and that in a clear confession of it we are connected to faithful believers of all time and in all places. And we come in humble repentance, as our Lord Jesus himself directs his followers.

C: When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, "Repent," he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance.

Thesis 1

M: Therefore no one will be declared righteous in God's sight by the works of the law; rather, through the law we become conscious of our sin.

Romans 3:20

C: Those who believe that they can be certain of their salvation because they have indulgence letters will be eternally damned, together with their teachers.

Thesis 32

M: Any truly repentant Christian has a right to full remission of penalty and guilt, even without indulgence letters.

Thesis 36

C: Any true Christian, whether living or dead, participates in all the blessings of Christ and the church; and this is granted him by God, even without indulgence letters.

Thesis 37

M: If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.

1 John 1:8-9

- C: If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.
- M: Let us therefore confess our sins.
- C: Holy God, gracious Father, I am sinful by nature, and I have sinned against you in my thoughts, words, and actions. I have not loved you with my whole heart; I have not loved others as I should. I deserve your punishment both now and forever. But Jesus, my Savior paid for my sins with his holy life and innocent death. Trusting in him, I pray: God, have mercy on me, a sinner.

ABSOLUTION

M: Our gracious Father in heaven has been merciful to us. He sent his only Son, Jesus Christ, who gave his life as the atoning sacrifice for the sins of the whole world. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

Thesis 94

M: By the grace of God may we be built up in faith to battle temptation, to stand firm against adversity, and to boldly confess our faith.

Christians should be exhorted to be diligent in following Christ, their Head, through penalties, death and hell.

Thesis 95

C: And thus be confident of entering into heaven through many tribulations rather than through the false security of peace.

Danish hymn-writer Nikolai Grundtvig likely witnessed the destruction of Copenhagen's medieval Church of Our Lady during the Napoleonic Wars. which may have led him to use such imagery in this hymn. His words remind us that Christ's Church is not bound to a physical building. Rather, the Church is made up of "living stones" built on the foundation of Jesus Christ. 1 Peter 2:4-5: As you come to him, the living Stone rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him—you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood,

SERMON

Psalm 46 "It's About Something"

God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging. There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy place where the Most High dwells. God is within her, she will not fall; God will help her at break of day. Nations are in uproar, kingdoms fall; he lifts his

voice, the earth melts. The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress. Come and see what the LORD has done, the desolations he has brought on the earth. He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth. He breaks the bow and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire. He says, "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress.

We join in confessing our Christian faith using the words of Luther's explanation to the Apostles' Creed. This explanation was published in Luther's Small Catechism in 1529.

CONFESSION OF FAITH

- M: I believe that God created me and all that exists,
- C: and that he gave me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my mind and all my abilities.
- M: And I believe that God still preserves me by richly and daily providing clothing and shoes, food and drink, property and home, spouse and children, land, cattle, and all I own, and all I need to keep my body and life.
- C: God also preserves me by defending me against all danger, guarding and protecting me from all evil.
- M: All this God does only because he is my good and merciful Father in heaven, and not because I have earned or deserved it.
- C: For all this I ought to thank and praise, to serve and obey him.
- M: I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from all eternity, and also true man, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord.
- C: He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil,
- M: not with gold or silver
- C: but with his holy precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death.
- M: All this he did that I should be his own, and live under him in his kingdom,
- C: and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he has risen from death and lives and rules eternally.
- M: I believe that I cannot by my own thinking or choosing believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to him.
- C: But the Holy Spirit has called me by the gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith.
- M: In the same way he calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith.
- C: In this Christian church he daily and fully forgives all sins to me and all believers.
- M: On the Last Day he will raise me and all the dead
- C: and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ.
- M: This is most certainly true.

- M: The work is not ours, O God, but yours. O Sovereign Lord and Creator, we have no way to satisfy your righteousness, nothing to contest the great Deceiver's earthly power, nothing to mute its false attractions, nothing to uproot the rule of our sinful flesh.
- C: We would gladly pass our days in happiness and peace in an age awash with iniquity. Hear us, heavenly Father, for the cause is yours. Yes, Creator of all that is, your cause is righteous and everlasting. Vindicate your name among the nations!
- M: O all-seeing Lord, have mercy on your church. You understand our plight. We thank you for sending a messenger of peace to correct our lives. This One is your Son, Jesus the Christ, the incarnate Savior, who saves us from calamities that plague your church.
- C: You have chosen us to do your work. Therefore, O God, accomplish it by your will. Stand by your church each day in the name of Jesus, who is our shelter and shield, our mighty fortress. Through the strength of the Holy Spirit, such faith works joy and peace and willingness to serve a world in need.

This prayer is based on the one Luther prayed at the Diet of Worms in 1521. There he made a bold confession in the face of authorities in the church and the government. A version of this prayer was used in a Reformation service at the 2017 WELS Worship Conference.

- M: We are even ready to lay down our lives for this cause, as were your servants Martin Luther and his fellow Reformers and Confessors, who forcefully stormed the kingdom of heaven to restore the gospel of your righteousness to its central place in Christian life.
- C: The cause is holy. Though this world is filled with devils and though our bodies perish in persecution, your Word and your Spirit still remain. The church always needs reform as its message encounters the false and the frivolous. But the Word of God stands firm forever.
- M: In the confidence of faith, gracious Lord, bless our efforts to spread the gospel of the glory and grace of God throughout the world to the joy and edifying of all who hear and believe and for your glory and our good.
- C: Amen.

LORD'S PRAYER

C: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.




WORDS OF INSTITUTION

DISTRIBUTION

This morning we celebrate Holy Communion by "continuous distribution." An usher will dismiss a row at a time. Please proceed to the back of the auditorium and to the hallway through the aisle indicated by the usher. Pause to receive the wafer from the minister who speaks the words, "The body of Christ, given for you." Pause to take a cup from the minister who speaks the words, "The blood of Christ, shed for you." You may say, "Amen" to acknowledge the ministers' words and the real presence of our Lord's body and blood. Follow the direction of the usher to return to the auditorium and to your seat by the indicated aisle on the other side of your row.

Should you require gluten-free wafers or grape juice, please ask the usher for a card indicating that, which will assist the minister serving you. As necessary, you may remain seated and have the ministers serve you in your row. In that case, please ask for a blue card so the ministers may recognize your request.

and is often attributed to the poet Arnag. Arnag was the godson of Fredrick the Wise and helped the spread of the Lutheran Reformation throughout Germany. Of this hvmn the German scholar Wilhelm Nelle wrote, "Like Luther's Lord, Keep Us Steadfast this hymn was forbidden by the authorities, pastors were deposed from office for having it sung, in short, it has a history of battle and victory as much as the best hymns of Luther."

In celebration of the 300th Anniversary of the Reformation, Nikolai Grundtvig translated Luther's A Mighty Fortress into Danish, and added these words as a fifth stanza.

This hymn tune (REUTER) was written by Professor Friedrich O. Reuter of Dr. Martin Luther College to be used with the hymn Lord Jesus Christ, the Church's Head. which was originally sung to the tune EIN FESTE BURG (A Mighty Fortress). His new version of that hymn opened the worship service for the 400th **Anniversary** Celebration of the Reformation on September 30, 1917 held at Dr. Martin Luther College.
