

About the Cover Art

This nativity scene depicts both the majesty and humility of our Savior as written about in Martin Luther's hymn, *From Heaven Above to Earth I Come*. Our King, by whom the heavens and earth were made, arrives as a little child of lowly birth. Within the scene you will also find the elements of Luther's seal, which will be highlighted during the service.

About the Hymn

Luther's hymn, From Heaven Above to Earth I Come, is actually a contrafactum (sacred text set to a popular folk melody) of Ich Komm Aus Fremden Landen Her. Note how Luther parodies the first verse of the original secular song:

<u>Ich Komm Aus Fremden Landen Her</u> <u>From Heaven Above to Earth I Come</u>

Good news from far abroad I bring, Glad tidings for you all I sing. I bring so much you'd like to know Much more than I shall tell you though. From heav'n above to earth I come To bear good news to ev'ry home; Glad tidings of great joy I bring, Whereof I now will say and sing.

Eventually Luther would write his own tune, VOM HIMMEL HOCH, which is the melody found in most hymnals today. In Part 3 of this service, you will have an opportunity to hear an arrangement of the original tune, ICH KOMM AUS FREMDEN LANDEN HER.

PROCESSIONAL HYMN

Savior of the Nations, Come Christian Worship #2 st. 1-3

This hymn is attributed to St. Ambrose and was originally written in Latin. Luther translated the text into German in 1523 and transformed the tune from a plainsong chant to a simplified chorale.

INTRODUCTION

Part 1: KNOW

Luther's explanation of his seal:

First, there is a black cross in a heart that remains its natural color. This is to remind me that it is faith in the Crucified One that saves us. It is a black cross, which mortifies and causes pain, but it leaves the heart its natural color. It doesn't destroy nature, that is to say, it does not kill us but keeps us alive, for the just shall live by faith in the Crucified One (Romans 1:17).

Stanzas 1-2: Know That Christ Is Born for You

Sung by the Children:


"From heav'n above to earth I come To bear good news to ev'ry home; Glad tidings of great joy I bring, Whereof I now will say and sing: "To you this night is born a child Of Mary, chosen virgin mild; This little child of lowly birth Shall be the joy of all the earth."

Recitations: Luke 2:1-7 Matthew 1:22-23 John 3:16

Luther: Mary, you did not bear this child for yourself alone . . . but for me. . . . I have a greater honor than your honor as his mother. For . . . my honor is this, that you have my treasure, so that I know none, neither men nor angels, who can help me except this child whom you, O Mary, hold in your arms.

Stanzas 3-4: Know Freedom From Sin

Sung by the Congregation



Recitations: Psalm 51:1-2 Genesis 2:17 Genesis 3:15 Galatians 4:4-5 1 John 2:2 Luke 2:8-11 1 Timothy 1:15-16

Luther: For, if it is true that the child was born of the virgin and is mine, then I have no angry God and I must know . . . that there is nothing but laughter and joy in the heart of the Father and no sadness in my heart. For, if what the angel says is true, that he is our Lord and Savior, what can sin do against us? "If God is for us, who is against us?" Greater words than these I cannot speak.

HYMN: Children

All Praise to You, Eternal God

Christian Worship #33 st. 1-3

New hymn tune by Kathy Parra

All praise to you, eternal God! Now clothed in human flesh and blood, You took a manger for your throne While worlds on worlds are yours alone. Alleluia! Once did the skies before you bow; A virgin's arms contain you now While angels, who in you rejoice, Now listen for your infant voice. Alleluia!

O little Child, you were our guest
That weary ones in you might rest;
Forlorn and lowly was your birth
That we might rise to heav'n from earth.
Alleluia!

The first stanza of this hymn was a popular German pre-Reformation song and was one of three hymns the German people were allowed to sing in the German language as congregational responses during the Latin Mass in the Middle Ages. Luther added additional stanzas for Christmas in 1523.

Stanza 5: Know the Signs of the Savior

Sung by the Children:

"These are the signs which you shall mark:

The swaddling clothes and manger dark.

There you will find the infant laid

By whom the heav'ns and earth were made."


Recitations: Luke 2:12 Luke 2:13-14

Luther: If Christ had come with trumpets and had a cradle of gold, his birth would have been a splendid affair. But it would not have been comforting to me. He was rather to lie in the lap of a poor maiden and be considered of little consequence in the eyes of the world. Now I can come to him.

HYMN: Children and Congregation

To Shepherds as They Watched by Night

Christian Worship #53 st. 1-2



This Christmas hymn was written by Luther in 1542. It states the Christmas story in a more concise manner and was meant to be used when "From Heaven Above to Earth I Come" was thought to be too lengthy.

<u>Part 2: GO</u>

Luther's explanation of his seal:

Anyone who believes from the heart will be justified (Romans 10:10).

Stanzas 6-7: Go and See

Sung by the Choir:

How glad we'll be to find it so! Then with the shepherds let us go To see what God for us has done In sending us his own dear Son. Come here, my friends, lift up your eyes, And see what in the manger lies. Who is this child, so young and fair? It is the Christchild lying there.


Recitations: Luke 2:15-16 Psalm 122:1

Luther: We need to be kept in the diligent use of the Word and flee that deadliest of notions that we understand and know it well enough, as many nowadays imagine. . . . [We] want to be its steady pupils . . . daily filled with new ardor for the Word.

Now Praise We Christ, the Holy One

Christian Worship #39 st. 6-7



Children 6. The heav'n-ly choirs re-joice and raise Their voice to God in songs of praise. To Congregation 7. All hon-or un-to Christ the Lord, E-ter-nal and in-car-nate Word, With



This hymn was originally part of a longer 23-stanza Latin abecedarian (alphabetical) poem written by Coelius Sedulius during the fifth century glorifying the life of Christ. It was later divided into two hymns with the first seven stanzas (found in CW 39) designed to be used on Christmas Day. Luther's German translation of this hymn appeared in two German hymnals in 1524. (Additional stanzas from the original poem can be found in CW 91.)

Part 3: GLOW

Luther's explanation of his seal:

The heart should stand in the middle of a white rose. This is to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace—it puts the believer into a white, joyous rose. Faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). This is why the rose must be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and angels (cf. Matthew 28:3; John 20:12).

Stanzas 8-11: Glow with Confidence in Christ's Humble Sacrifice!

Sung by the Soloists:

Welcome to earth, O noble Guest, Through whom the sinful world is blest! You came to share my misery That you might share your joy with me.

Were earth a thousand times as fair And set with gold and jewels rare, It would be far too poor and small A cradle for the Lord of all. Ah, Lord, though you created all, How weak you are, so poor and small, That you should choose to lay your head Where lowly cattle lately fed!

Instead of soft and silken stuff You have but hay and straw so rough On which as King, so rich and great, To be enthroned in royal state.

This arrangement of stanzas 8-11 features both the familiar tune (VON HIMMEL HOCH) and the hymn's original tune (ICH KOMM AUS FREMDEN LANDEN HER). Stanza 8: VON HIMMEL HOCH; Stanza 9: ICH KOMM AUS FREMDEN LANDEN HER; Stanzas 10 & 11: medleys of both tunes.

Recitations: 2 Corinthians 8:9 Isaiah 53:4,6


Luther: This is the confidence of Christians and the joyousness of our conscience: that through faith our sins become not ours but Christ's, upon whom God laid the sins of us all and who bore our sins. . . . All the righteousness of Christ, in turn, becomes ours. For he places his hand upon us, and it is well with us; he, the Savior, blessed forever, spreads his garment and covers us.

HYMN: Congregation


Part 4: GROW

Luther's explanation of his seal:

This rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that a joyful spirit and faith is a beginning of heavenly, future joy, which begins now, but is grasped in hope, not yet fully revealed.

Stanzas 12-13: Grow as Christ Remains Within

Sung by the Congregation:



Luther: A man who has devoted himself to the wealth and honor of the world, meanwhile forgetting his soul and his God, resembles a little child which holds in its hand a beautifully shaped and colored apple and fancies it has something good. But on the inside the apple is rotten and full of worms.


Recitations: Philippians 2:3-4 Ephesians 3:16-17

A legend states that as Martin Luther was walking home one evening, he was so in awe of the stars twinkling through the evergreens that he brought a tree into his home and decorated it with candles in an attempt to recreate the experience for his family. Although we do not know how much truth there is to the legend, some early artwork (1854) reflects a belief in the story.



We Now Implore God the Holy Ghost

Christian Worship #190 st. 2-3



The first stanza of this hymn dates from about the 13th century. It is an example of a popular medieval sacred folk song ending in "Kyrie eleison" (Lord, have mercy) and is thus called a Leise. Luther regarded this Leise highly and included it in his Formula Missae (Latin Mass) as a hymn that might be sung after Holy Communion. Shortly thereafter, he added three additional stanzas and the hymn gained great popularity among the German people.

Part 5: OVERFLOW

Luther's explanation of his seal:

Around the field of blue is a golden ring to symbolize that blessedness in heaven lasts forever and has no end. Heavenly blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and better than any possessions, just as gold is the most valuable and precious metal.

Stanzas 14-15: Overflow With Praise

Recitations: Luke 2:17-20 Acts 4:20


Sung by the Children:

My heart for very joy must leap; My lips no more can silence keep. I, too, must sing with joyful tongue That sweetest ancient cradle song.

Recitation: 2 Corinthians 4:14-15

Luther: We have nothing to give in return except praise, glory, and gratitude for the unspeakable gift . . . which through the Gospel God has shed on us abundantly.
