PASTOR LOUISE

In the home stretch for the November Lamplighter there was a monster storm. Our priorities changed over night. The church and parsonage lost some siding and electricity was off for about three days: inconveniences, nothing more. For many in the congregation and in this area, it is far beyond an inconvenience. Homes flooded, furniture and other possessions ruined. The list seems endless. The grief is deep and may not yet be recognized. It will pop up at unexpected times and may dig up old memories of loss.

Our congregation has been giving assistance where we have been able. We don't have a formal count of members who suffered significant loss or hardship (due to prolonged outages). I can identify over twenty families in our congregation. We are gradually finding out about persons who have had to move to family or friends. Communication has been frustratingly difficult.

A week after the storm we opened up our church on Monday and Tuesday (November 5 & 6). Initially the idea was to give people a place of warmth and light. They could charge electronic devices and find camaraderie in others facing similar crises. Soon, however, the hospitality expanded to homemade soup, bagels, and drinks. Some came by and stayed only to get warm and fed. Others were there longer in animated conversation or lively board games. The Church Attic has been liberal in giving clothes to people in need, coffee and a listening ear. We gathered up cleaning supplies, drinks, and food to take to St. Martin 's for them to distribute.

On at least three occasions, members set up a "station" in Amity Harbor where food, coffee, and sweets were given out freely. One Sunday afternoon we were not far from a Red Cross truck. To reach as many as possible they gave us some of their items, like laundry bags with flashlights, ready-to-eat meals, and cleaning supplies. There is more about these occasions of outreach in the Stewardship article.

Suddenly the reality of Thanksgiving sank in and plans were quickly laid to have a community Thanksgiving dinner. Turkeys were showing up at our door, spontaneous delivery of bakery bread, cases of water and soda, and volunteers! Bakers and cooks of sweet potatoes, cornbread, gravy, green bean casserole, pumpkin and apple pies produced the traditional fare.

We hosted about 35 people—members and non-members, including folk from Community UMC, Massapequa. It was a beautiful giving of thanks.

Teams of relief volunteers are being coordinated out of Community UMC, Massapequa . Hicksville Methodist has been providing housing, with our getting some of the overflow. We have housed twelve people who have come to help with clean-up. We hosted two volunteers at the parsonage from New Life Community UMC, in New Fairfield, Connecticut. During the week of November 18 we had up to ten people sleeping in the church on air mattresses. Eight of them were from Newtown UMC, Sandy Hook, Connecticut and two from North Carolina . Because we have no showers in the church, Big Al's, a large gym on Merrick Road, allowed them to take their showers there. The outpouring of giving whatever gift, resource, or time people have has been remarkable.

We have taken up several offerings to help buy and equip a disaster relief trailer that the Long Island East district needs to buy. The amount raised from our congregation is \$701. The offerings are quite generous, given the number of people dealing with very large bills from destruction during the storm.

One of the greatest gifts we have been privileged to give has been time and a listening presence. Many have said that it could have been so much worse. Keeping a larger perspective is part of the healing. At the same time, the losses are more than monetary. Hundreds of adjustments are on-going and Christmas will be very different this year for thousands. People who walked down to their basement which was flooded after Superstorm Sandy often were hit with a sense of "this can't be!" In the tradition of choosing between crying and laughing, there was an opportunity for the laughing. When the Bedell family found their basement flooded, there was an unexpected sight: floating on top of the water in their basement was Noah's Ark.

I pray that people are rebuilding wisely both literally and spiritually. There have been many God-moments in my experience and for others as I have heard people tell about what they have endured. During Advent we often speak of Emmanuel, "God with Us". Indeed God is!

We were a small group but at the same time a commanding presence with our report to the district superintendent.

World communion Sunday, October 7th, we had a guest preacher; none other than our own Pastor Dick Johns. He helped us understand Jesus' thoughts on divorce by explaining a passage some of us had difficulty with. We had refreshments shared by members from their country of origin. Hope to see more participants next year; this was a holiday weekend.

October 14th we were happy to honor Pastor Louise and her husband and express thanks and appreciation for their service every day. It was a time to take note of the things pastors do that we don't see and how their lives are impacted by each and every member of the congregation; both spiritually and physically.

Laity Sunday was October 21st. Once again Bob Silz led us in worship. It was a wonderful service and gave us insight into why and how we should use our gifts to share the Word of God with everyone we meet; thus following Jesus' example of making disciples for the transformation of the world.

The handbell choir performed at Broadlawn Manor Nursing home on Saturday, November 17th. The residents were a wonderful audience.

November 18th we celebrated, what I hope will be, our first annual Staff Appreciation Day. Several members of our congregation shared thoughts, thanks and appreciation for the dedication and commitment displayed by Andres Aguilera, Linda Cohen and Robyn Hyland. Members of our church family provided individual notes of thanks to each of the honorees. Following worship we enjoyed cake and coffee in their honor. 

Never has this been more apparent than in the aftermath of the Hurricane/Super Storm Sandy.

First United Methodist was a valuable presence in our community showing what we as a Christian can and are willing to do to assist our neighbors and surrounding communities.

Our committees worked together to provide a safe, warm, lighted haven to eat a meal, charge your cell phone and a few hours of respite.

Several times groups of people went out into the community serving, soup, sandwiches, hot drinks and a shoulder to lean on.

One Sunday after church, a group which included several children set up on a corner in the hard hit area south of Merrick Road towards the end of Richmond Avenue. After delivering hot coffee to two people who thanked them so much for what they were doing, the one girl said, "It makes you feel good to help others." Evidently, the Stewardship song they learned in Sunday School had left quite an impression on them.

Many of our members took others into their homes who either still didn't have heat and lights or whose homes were destroyed by the flood waters. It is easy to be a good steward. Just look around, see where there is a need both in and out of church and serve the Lord and your neighbors.

During the Advent season may we all remember that "Jesus is the Reason for the Season". Many have lost so much from this devastating storm. Perhaps, we can still be a guiding light and show those around us that God is Alive and will give them the strength to endure the difficult weeks ahead. Sometimes just knowing that others care can make a big difference and help those hurting to get through another day.

Let us remember to be thankful for what we have.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY

ROBERT SILZ, CHAIRPERSON

In Mark 10:44-45 Jesus says that "whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave to all." Jesus brings into sharp focus that our greatest success comes from helping others.

To date, conations of about 420 pounds of produce from our Garden of Hope and contributions from some of those who have maintained gardens at their homes has been shared between the Freeport Pantry and the soup kitchen at the Farmingdale United Methodist Church.

A more recent example of our outreach to feed the hungry on Long Island comes from the efforts of the UMW to collect many pounds of bagels donated by Poppy's Bagels in Amityville. These have been added to the garden produce taken to the Freeport Pantry each week. It is also noteworthy that the consistent efforts of the UMW at the Church Attic provide sizeable monetary donations to the Long Island Council of Churches.

A letter received from Pastor Tom Goodhue, Executive Director of the Long Island Council of Churches reveals the importance of servant initiatives.

Thanks to your gifts and contributions from other generous donors, last year we fed 21,215 hungry Long Islanders 190,935 meals, provided rent and mortgage assistance to 43 households, electricity, fuel gas and water assistance to 68 households, prescriptions assistance for 35 individuals and transportation assistance for 545. We also distributed clothes, coats, jackets, sweaters, and bedding to another 4,730 hosted a full-course thanksgiving Dinner for 475 East End residents and their families, distributed Thanksgiving and Christmas basket to 1,1003 families and gave Christmas gifts and toys to 738 children.

Here is an example of how your donations help our guests:

Sally is a single Mom with eight kids ages 2-12. She's frail and unable to work. Although she receives food stamps, they are not nearly sufficient to feed her large family. By the time she pays her rent, utilities and other basics, she has no money left to feed her family. She comes to us every week for food assistance, including baby formula for her youngest child. Without our help, she and her family would not survive.

You and our other donors make it possible for us to give all our guests hope, assistance, and to know that they are not being forgotten."

We will continue to collect food to support the LICC pantry. Any of the following items can be placed in the basket inside the front entrance to the church or to the church office:

Slavery is No More—Maybe!

On Saturday, October 20, 2012, four youth and three adults went into Manhattan to learn about human trafficking, "God is Calling. Will You Answer?" The event was put on by United Methodist Women. The group included Victoria Castellano, Analicia Gonzalez, Alyssia Leonardi, Holly Preisel, Margo Martinez, Robyn Hyland, and Pastor Louise. The morning session was about how God calls us in varied ways, even though people may discriminate against us. In the afternoon we heard about labor trafficking.

On the train ride back to Amityville, the youth and adults talked about the day:

Holly: From the stories people told, I learned a lot. It opened my eyes to see how I can help other people that I didn't know about before. I liked the cheerful songs and how welcoming they were at the church.

Victoria: It was fun. I met new friends and learned about human trafficking.

Alyssia: I learned about how Damayan [an advocacy organization for migrant workers] is helping people in the world.

Analicia: Some people don't know about trafficking. Once they learn, maybe they will do something about this unfortunate situation.

Margo: It is a shame that members of the diplomatic corps here and in other countries can get away with human trafficking.

Robyn: It is important to remember that there is a privilege of latitude and longitude: where we are born makes a big difference. All people should be able to realize their potential. Youth can be advocates for social justice; one person can change things.

Although the Emancipation Proclamation of January 1, 1863 began the process of freeing slaves in the United States, it was not until the adoption of the 13th Amendment in 1865 that slavery was outlawed. That is almost 150 years ago. But there is still "involuntary servitude" in our country and many other countries. It is hard to conceive that people become like slaves in restaurant work, factories, agricultural work, and domestic labor. Yet it is a reality.

What would you do if you had been hired to work as a nanny in another country and when you got to your job, your passport was taken, you had to work 16-18 hour days, got no time off, and received lower wages than promised? Most people respond, "I would leave", but getting away is often difficult if not dangerous. If that seems like something that only happens in other countries, think about the case from 2007 in which a Muttontown, Long Island couple was sent to prison for "enslaving two Indonesian housekeepers".

At the one day event, held at Grace UMC, 104th Street, we learned that human trafficking happens even on Long Island. We also heard that we can help change things!
