Mid-November several hurricane relief teams slept in our church or parsonage. Eight of those people were from Newtown United Methodist Church, Sandy Hook, Connecticut. That included their pastor, the Rev. Mel Kawakami. Before December 14, their community was barely known to most people in this country. On December 14 with the deadly shooting of twenty-eight people (including the shooter's mother and his suicide) it became a real place! Those who volunteered to help people on Long Island suddenly needed help—of a much different kind. I pray for the family members of the victims and others who have been traumatized. With our hosting the relief team, there is a face to the tragedy.

A crisis of this magnitude reveals our fault lines and the best of humanity. The easiest issue to identify is that of guns: who can/should have them, their lethality, and what laws are needed. Flippant responses such as "guns don't kill people; people kill people" are intended to shut down any meaningful conversation about a lethal issue.

In a letter to President Obama written after the Connecticut school shooting, the Rev. Bill Medford of the United Methodist General Board of Church and Society, asks our president to do two things:

- "1. Make gun ownership a more responsible process with universal background checks no matter where the gun is purchased.
- "2. Reinstate a vigorous ban on assault weapons."

As reasonable as that is to me, there are plenty of people who will disagree.

Inevitably some will say that gun violence is a political issue not an issue for the church. But the Methodist Church, under the leadership of John Wesley, has been involved in social issues since its earliest formation. Among other concerns were the slave trade, education, childcare, the poor, and incarceration. Wesley was instrumental in the opening of a free public dispensary, because of his writings on medicine. There is no way to separate us into body or spirit. Our worship of God is impacted by our physical being. If we believe we should love God and neighbor, then the circumstances of my "neighbor's" life are part of my faith.

In our 2008 *Book of Discipline*, Social Principles, it states: "The church should continually exert a strong ethical influence upon the state, supporting policies and programs deemed to be just and opposing policies and programs that are unjust." The words "just" and "unjust" are key to our witness as Christians. But under the guise of allegiance to the cross of Christ, many terrible, and unjust things have been done.

Along with debates over guns has been the issue of mental health. People continue to be stigmatized because of mental illness. Since the mid-50s there has been a trend to use less restrictive methods for persons with mental illnesses. This has been because more effective medication and treatment have become available. It is also because of the criminal abuses within "mental institutions" that were exposed. But deinstitutionalization of the mentally ill has had the usual unintended consequences. One is fewer resources available and the lack of follow-up possible for persons needing ongoing supervision.

The pattern of mass shootings appears to have a strong connection with a mental issue of some kind. People don't "snap" from a well state to becoming a mass murderer. There is almost always a littering of the perpetrator's life with episodes of mental instability that either goes unnoticed or unaddressed. What I have not been hearing about is the alarming connection between suicides and guns, 50% of which are by firearms. The mental issue of depression is often a factor. The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention reports these disturbing realities:

- In 2010 over 38,000 people in the United States died by suicide.
- Although most gun owners reportedly keep a firearm in their home for "protection" or "self defense," 83 percent of gun-related deaths in these homes are the result of a suicide, often by someone other than the gun owner.
- Death by firearms is the fastest growing method of suicide.
- Firearms are used in more suicides than homicides.

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The National Institute of Justice reports the number of homicides in 2005 by handguns and other types of guns to be 11,346. That is about 2/3 of the total number of homicides, approximately 16,700.

If we can't have civil discourse in our churches, synagogues, and mosques about guns and their availability and about our country's commitment to treat mental illness then I have to state that we are not the believers we say we are.

There is an article on page 10 by one of our members, Eric Maxson, titled "Many More?" It is his response to gun violence in our country. It is strong and well reasoned. Although you may not agree with every thing he states, I urge you to read it. Then can you have a civil conversation with someone else who does not agree with you or the article?

2012 was a financially difficult year for many due to the devastation of Hurricane/Super Storm Sandy, higher gas and food prices. With the financial situation in mind, we set our goal for the 2013 Pledge Campaign to be \$90,000.00. We considered this goal would be attainable since for 2012 we had a total of \$103,000.00 pledged. We fell \$2,500 short of our expectations. We are hoping that those that did not pledge yet, will make a commitment to FUMC for 2013. Another consideration is our members will step-up and put a little extra over what they pledged to help us cover the 2013 budget.

As Steve Brice mentioned in a previous article, our building's insurance went up a tremendous amount and really put a crunch in the overall budget.

Speaking of additional hands, cleaning-up after fellowship on Sunday mornings is greatly appreciated. Everyone enjoys having a cup of coffee, tea or juice with a snack before heading home, but few people stay to clean-up and help in the kitchen. Won't you consider staying a few Sundays this year and lend your assistance? This is another example of "being a good steward".

Easter is early this year, which means that Ash Wednesday is just around the corner along with our Lenten Self-Denial cups. The committee will be meeting to discuss the recipients of this year's Lenten sacrifice. We usually divide the contributions in half and use one portion for something that benefits FUMC and the 2nd portion for a project outside of our community. Why not begin early and start saving your coins now to put in the cup?

CHURCH AND SOCIETY ISSUES FOR 2013

When we study the Social Creed of our denomination, we see it is rich in ways to bring our faith into practice. The creed is similar to historic creeds such as the Apostles' Creed, which state what we believe.

United Methodist Social Creed

We believe in God, Creator of the world; and in Jesus Christ, the Redeemer of creation. We believe in the Holy Spirit, through whom we acknowledge God's gifts, and we repent of our sin in misusing these gifts to idolatrous ends.

We affirm the natural world as God's handiwork and dedicate ourselves to its preservation, enhancement, and faithful use by humankind.

We joyfully receive for ourselves and others the blessings of community, sexuality, marriage, and the family.

We commit ourselves to the rights of men, women, children, youth, young adults, the aging, and people with disabilities; to improvement of the quality of life; and to the rights and dignity of all persons.

We believe in the right and duty of persons to work for the glory of God and the good of themselves and others and in the protection of their welfare in so doing; in the rights to property as a trust from God, collective bargaining, and responsible consumption; and in the elimination of economic and social distress.

We dedicate ourselves to peace throughout the world, to the rule of justice and law among nations, and to individual freedom for all people of the world.

We believe in the present and final triumph of God's Word in human affairs and gladly accept our commission to manifest the life of the gospel in the world.

Words attributed to John Wesley, Founder of Methodism

"Do all the good you can, By all the means you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as ever you can." In addition to the Social Creed of the UMC, there are social principles. Here are some of those principles:

The Natural World

As Christians and United Methodists we are obliged to consider what we can do both as individuals and as members the Body of Christ to bring about global peace "through acts of loving care and respect. Economic, political, social, and technological developments have increased our human numbers, and lengthened and enriched our lives. However, these developments have led to regional defoliation, dramatic extinction of species, massive human suffering, overpopulation, and misuse and overconsumption of natural and nonrenewable resources, particularly by industrialized societies. This continued course of action jeopardizes the natural heritage that God has entrusted to all generations. Therefore, let us recognize the responsibility of the church and its members to place a high priority on changes in economic, political, social, and technological lifestyles to support a more ecologically equitable and sustainable world leading to a higher quality of life for all of God's creation."

The Nurturing Community

We believe we have a responsibility to innovate, sponsor, and evaluate new forms of community that will encourage development of the fullest potential in individuals. Primary for us is the gospel understanding that all persons are important—because they are human beings created by God and loved through and by Jesus Christ and not because they have merited significance. We therefore support social climates in which human communities are maintained and strengthened for the sake of all persons and their growth. We also encourage all individuals to be sensitive to others by using appropriate language when referring to all persons. Language of a derogatory nature (with regard to race, nationality, ethnic background, gender, sexuality, and physical differences) does not reflect value for one another and contradicts the gospel of Jesus Christ."

The recent tragic losses due to hurricane Sandy and the senseless shooting at the Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut are clear messages that we need to be the hands and feet of Christ in a broken world.

In 2013 we pray for God to lead us in our discernment!

MANY MORE?

History is giving us an opportunity. Sometimes it is in times of crisis when real change can be made. In the horrible wake of yet another school shooting it is incumbent on all of us as individuals and a nation to take real and lasting action on getting guns out of our midst.

While it is people who use the guns that cause such destruction, it is undeniably the easy availability of guns to those who would use them that makes the destruction possible. It is not realistically feasible to identify, cure or contain all those in the world who might take out their anger on the rest of us, but we can realistically take away the tools that make their anger massively deadly.

Gun 'control' does not remove the possibility of deadly sprees. And there is no real 'control' of them. Even legally obtained and registered firearms can and do lead to shooting sprees like that in Newtown, CT, and on Christmas Eve in Webster, NY. In the latter, the shooter was successful in getting a neighbor's daughter to buy guns for him. He used them to ambush and kill two firefighters responding to a house fire. In these and other cases, it wasn't that the guns weren't 'controlled'; it was that they existed at all and were there for the taking.

The only way to prevent these kind of incidents is to make guns unavailable entirely. Yes, a deranged person shot those children, but it was a deranged person with easy access to high volume weapons. And those were legally obtained and licensed weapons, but they still pose a threat. Let's take guns away from everyone, good guys and bad guys alike.

What we are doing is leaving dangerous toys lying around where anyone can grab one and use it in whatever irrational way he or she chooses. You would never leave scissors or knives lying around your house in plain sight and easy reach if you had a toddler in the house, but what we are doing is far worse by allowing guns to be in our homes.

From a purely practical perspective, guns do not serve a real and positive use in our society today. They are toys, used for recreational purposes. Any benefit that is derived from gun ownership in our time is far outweighed by the harm they cause. Any conceptual or recreational purpose they represent pales in comparison to the actual, real life horror and carnage they facilitate. Who wants to be the one to sit across the table from a mother who has lost a child to gun violence and tell her that the life of her child had to be taken so that we can go out target shooting on the weekends? Or so we can go out and blow away a deer in the fall? And to those who would argue that we need to be armed in order to be able to defend ourselves against our own government if need be, there is no realistic possibility that a citizen militia can now stand up to the modern US Army—even if it were necessary. And was that not the intent of the framers of the Constitution?

The Constitution is not the Bible. It is a great document, but it was written by men, and even by the loosest interpretation of the actual words, those men were writing in the time that they lived in, with the realities that existed at that time. They could not see the future, or the time that we live in now.

What we need is a national law forbidding all guns in all states. Yes, it will take years and years to make a real change in the supply, even if all guns were outlawed today. But we can and should start sometime, and gradually they would dwindle and disappear, and make us all safer.

Let's not lose this chance, when the effects that guns have in our midst are so clear and so tangible, and the horror so immediate, and let's not forget to keep pushing for a change, even after these funerals have ended. If we don't, there will be many, many more.
