Anniversaries are a good time both to review and look forward. As I begin my eighth year as pastor at First United Methodist Church, I am excited about what lies ahead. I have also been reflecting on my time among you.

On Sunday, July 8 we had the annual reappointment celebration. I am grateful to Linda Thompson as Lay Leader and Robyn Hyland as Director of Music Ministries for organizing this each year. In my sermon I talked about how the congregation has affected my ministry. These were some of my thoughts:

"Recently I have noticed in my preparation that very familiar passages of scripture are revealing new thoughts and causing different exploration. In fact often there are so many things that intrigue me I have a hard time deciding where the Spirit is leading. A phrase may stand out that I had never considered. Or I'll think, I can't believe this is the first time I noticed that. I am convinced that one reason for new insights is this congregation—you! In one or two churches I have tried to serve I have felt like nothing could awaken the people out of their determination to be mediocre disciples-if there is such a thing. Would it help if I stood on my head? No. How about a spectacular healing? Probably not. It would be basically a ho-hum reaction. Or, it might be, "That was entertaining, pastor. What else can you do?" Feeling free from having to prove something or amuse the masses has unleashed new understandings in scripture.

"I believe you are calling out something more in me. I am not always the one invoking and paying attention to the work of the Spirit. Your openness, questions, comments, initiative, and the occasional—I don't agree with what you said or are doing are all welcome stimuli for my continued growth. It also encourages me." "Jesus and the disciples suffered rejection and failure. We will also, because God is still sending people out. Whatever we do or say we should be able to answer in some fashion that reflects our commission: Why are we doing what we are doing or planning? If it doesn't advance God's reign on earth, we need to recalibrate. Even when that is clear, we may sense a depletion of our authority. Doing the right thing will not always garner applause. Then we can remind ourselves of

Jesus' instructions to the disciples while on those missionary journeys. If they are not welcomed and the people refuse to listen, they are to 'shake off the dust on [their] feet as a testimony against them' (Mark 6:11). There is no hostility implied and no retribution. It is simply recognition of our limitations or the limitations of those with whom we desire to share and serve. But, like Jesus and the disciples we will also experience great joy and amazement when we have been instruments of God's healing power."

My husband, Dick, retired after nearly 40 years of pastoring, puts it succinctly: "Some churches multiply by ten what the pastor does. Some divide by ten." I believe we have been and continue to be a congregation that multiplies what each of us does. Let's encourage one another to keep on serving and growing in Christ-likeness.

July 15: Bruce Almíghty

Bruce Nolan works for a television station as a reporter. He has a gift for human interest stories, but is determined to be an anchor. When he doesn't get the job, he blames God. Then he says a halfhearted prayer for God to show him what to do. God uses Bruce's anger to offer him the job of being God for a week—in Buffalo, NY. There are two rules he must follow. 1) He is to tell no one that he is to be God, and 2) He can't mess with free will. When he and his girl friend split up he asks God, "How do you make someone love you without affecting free will?" God replies, "Welcome to my world, son!" Bruce's struggle is to recognize that everything does not revolve around him.

July 22: Charlotte's Web

Wilbur the pig is the runt of a litter and the 11th

piglet who has no chance of being nursed by the mother. Fern, daughter of the farmer, insists that her father not kill the pig. She nurses the piglet and names it Wilbur, but must finally let him be taken to another farm where he is to be fattened for the dinner table. Charlotte A. Cavatica is the spider who devises a plan using her abilities to weave webs in order to save him. At the end of the movie Wilbur has to deal with the death of Charlotte and what that means for him. The film is based on the book by E. B. White.

July 29: Coach Carter

Ken Carter was a sporting goods store owner in 1999 when he stepped into another world: coaching a high school basketball team in Richmond, California. The area was poor and the students generally not meeting their potential. They didn't seem to care much anyway. Based on the true story of Carter's revolution in the school, he faces predictable obstacles to motivate the students' academic work.

August 5: Rango

Being a chameleon can keep a body in something of an invisible state. But that is changed when Rango, a pet chameleon, accidentally winds up in the lawless town of Dirt. A drought has put everyone on edge and they are without a sheriff. Rango starts to invent a new identity and soon has placed himself as both sheriff and savior—with the promise to bring water to the town. Johnny Depp is the voice of Rango in the animated movie.

FIVE CONTINENTS: 988 DELEGATES: 60 NATIONS: 28 WORSHIP SERVICES BY PASTOR LOUISE

The headline gives a few stats from General Conference that was held in Tampa in late April. General Conference of the United Methodist Church is held every four years and is the only body that can pass legislation. Half of the delegates are lay and half are clergy. Bishops rotate in presiding, but have no vote.

One challenging issue was church structure. Although years of planning and discussion had taken place, and although the plan passed, the Judicial Council (our "Supreme Court") ruled on the last day of Conference that the restructuring was "unsalvageable". That was due mainly to the "commingling of authority and oversight". It was quite a blow to those who had worked on it and a surprise to the delegates.

Since 1972 the Discipline of the United Methodist Church has had the statement that the "practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian Teaching" (par. 304.3). I heartily disagree with that statement and am glad efforts continue to rectify the hurtful attitude and language. It is unconscionable that the mindset remains. Retired bishop, Melvin Talbert had strong words regarding its continued inclusion when he addressed a group at General Conference.

"I stand before you here this afternoon and I declare that God has already settled this matter: all human beings are created in the image of God.

There are no exceptions, no exclusions. We belong to the family of God.


"At the same time, I declare to you that the derogatory language and restrictive laws in the Book of Discipline are immoral and unjust and no longer deserve our loyalty and obedience."

Talbert said that the "time has come for those of us who are faithful to the Gospel of Jesus Christ to do what is required of us." ... "In light of the actions taken by the General Conference, the time has come to act and to invite others to join what I'm calling an act of Biblical obedience. "You see, we, too, have the good book on our side," he said, "our Biblical marching orders...." To Bishop Talbert's words, I say, "Amen".

The next big quadrennial gatherings are Jurisdictional Conferences, July 16-20. There are five jurisdictions in the United States. We are in the Northeastern Conference, which will meet in Charleston, West Virginia. The area includes churches from Washington, D. C. up through New England and as far west as Pennsylvania (ten annual conferences).

The most significant action is the election of three bishops to replace three retiring bishops. The first ballot is scheduled for Wednesday, July 18, after there has been opportunity for all of the persons nominated to meet with delegates. Our Annual Conference nominated three people: The Reverends Adrienne Brewington (Long Island East District Superintendent); Tim Riss (pastor, Hicksville UMC); Edward C. Horne (pastor of UMC of Westport and Weston, Connecticut). An additional nominee from our conference has been endorsed by the jurisdiction's Black Methodists for Church Renewal: the Reverend Maxine Nixon (pastor Fenimore Street UMC, Brooklyn). An Episcopacy Committee will assign the bishops to their area, after elections have been concluded. Just as local clergy can be moved, so can bishops. They are elected for life and may serve in an area a maximum of twelve years.

Please pray for God's Spirit to lead the delegates in their work at Jurisdictional Conference. The course of our denomination is directly affected by their action.

CALL TO ACTION REVISITED

Bishop Parks address to the NYAC underscored the need for a new church for a new world. He noted that the strength and vitality of the Methodist church has diminished over the last several decades -- the path that the church is taking is not sustainable. The Call to Action Initiative was designed to bring about a new vitality to the life of the United Methodist Church. The purpose of this Call to Action is to enable as many congregations as possible to become more vital by demonstrating signs of vitality in areas of mission and witness: worship attendance, new disciple making, small group ministries, mission and ministry engagement, and giving. Periodic assessments will determine the extent to which congregations are increasingly loving and growing communities adjusting to different ways of church life and achieving a new level of accountability. The bishop stated that, "If we lose our relevance, we won't last."

Bishop Park outlined three essential criteria to become a new church in a new world:

1. The church must be missionary, beginning with the mission field in its own back yard. It must dare to "define its mission based on those outside the church, those with little relationship to Jesus Christ." The bishop stated that, "Pastors can now longer be chaplains to their churches; members can no longer act like country club members... Everyone is in mission!"

2. The church must be led by young people. Young people must find a voice in the church now, Park said. "We must make serious commitment to nurturing and identifying young leaders and clergy now."The bishop pointed out that the "Imagine No Malaria" initiative is an excellent opportunity to get young people involved in efforts to make the world a better place. He noted that the United Methodist Church has set a goal to raise \$75 million to support education and prevention of this disease that takes the lives of 3,000 children each day.

3. A new church is what the Holy Spirit is about. The bishop concluded with the affirmation that a flourishing new church is achievable "not because of what we can do, but what we can do by the Holy Spirit."

MISSION – FIRST UMC GARDEN OF HOPE AND LOVE

The fruits of our labor are finally making a difference in the lives those in need! As of July 5th, we have harvested over 50 lbs. of produce and delivered it to the Long Island Council of Churches and other pantries in Freeport. We will also be sharing our harvest with the Farmingdale UMC to help with their community soup kitchen needs.

Thanks to the early seed plantings of Pastor Johns, we have an abundance of string beans, lettuce, and zucchini. Other crops that will become ready for harvesting are potatoes, onions, carrots, cucumbers, and tomatoes. So far those who have been involved in the harvesting are Pastor Johns, Missy Kennedy, and Bob Silz. We will need more assistance with harvesting as the season progresses. We are hoping that our youth will be involved to help the needy in our community.
