


PASTOR LOUISE

I am covered up in apps. I was at a Digital Ministry workshop at Camp Olmsted (UMC), Cornwall-on-Hudson. It was an intense two days. The leader, the Rev. Paul Moon, was throwing out suggestions for apps (applications) and software that would increase the church's digital presence in a world that relies increasingly on wireless and mobile connections. Added to my "smart phone" are Adobe Connect, YouTube, and B3M.

On my computer I downloaded Vertical Response that allows for large e-mail distribution, "event marketing" with online registration and more. I also downloaded Xilisoft video cutter so if I want to show a film clip I can edit how much is shown. I downloaded other tools and heard about a bunch more.

I learned that iPads are becoming popular with grandparents who may never have used a computer. They are buying, because they are able to see grandchildren who live miles away, through programs such as Skype.

I don't look any different, but my head is full of information and possibilities. By late spring you will see a big change in our website. It will be less "menu-driven" and more visual with a layout that is more appealing to an age range largely missing from many congregations: 20 and 30 year-olds. Our website and Facebook pages will be linked.

Concern is growing about the amount of time people are spending staring at a screen all the way from tiny to huge. Text messages fly between people no more than a few feet away, or in the next room. During church, people are accessing their accounts and staying in touch with friends and family. There is legitimate concern about the harm that has come in addictive behavior and the ways sometimes posts have bullied people and spread hurtful rumors.

There is nothing new about our needs, but how they are met has undergone tremendous change for millions of people.

Our workshop leader, Rev. Moon, said initially as he became more connected through mobile devices to parishioners, he thought attendance in worship and events would decrease. But he says just the opposite has happened. The connections made online have enhanced and encouraged face-to-face interaction.

Every major communicator and spiritual leader has found creative ways of reaching more people. It seems commonplace to us to read of Jesus' roving storytelling, but in his age, he was a sensation! John Wesley was not happy at all about preaching outdoors, but that was where the people were who needed to hear the message of salvation. The Wesley biographer, Basil Miller says, "Here was a crowd of people to whom Wesley's message came as a bursting light from heaven, and he would not deny them this glimpse of Christ."

The digital age is a cultural shift. It provides tools for new ways of sharing information. It has no morality in itself, but can be used in ways that are highly destructive and ways that are extremely beneficial. It is up to us to use the tools responsibly.

A "glimpse of Christ" can come through Facebook or YouTube, through a tweet or sermon on Sunday morning. We should use whatever ways God makes available.

Many of these children had to leave everything behind. Let us help to give them a ray of sunshine and let them know that others care about them by making their Easter a little bit brighter.


Lenten Series and Taizé service

MINISTRY WITH THE POOR

Listen my dear brothers and sisters: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the kingdom he promised those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who are exploiting you? Are they not the ones who are dragging you into court? Are they not the ones who are blaspheming the noble name to whom you belong? (James 2:5-7)

AS METHODISTS...

"We believe in the right and duty of persons to work for the glory of God and the good of themselves and others and in the protection of their welfare in so doing; in the rights to property as a trust from God, collective bargaining, and responsible consumption; and in the elimination of economic and social distress." *Social Principles of the United Methodist Church* 2005-2008

THE ECONOMIC COMMUNITY

"We claim all economic systems to be under the judgment of God no less than other facets of the created order. Therefore, we recognize the responsibility of governments to develop and implement sound fiscal and monetary policies that provide for the economic life of individuals and corporate entities and that ensure full employment and adequate incomes with a minimum of inflation. We believe private and public economic enterprises are responsible for the social costs of doing business, such as employment and environmental pollution, and that they should be held accountable for these costs. We support measures that would reduce the concentration of wealth in the hands of a few. We further support efforts to revise tax structures and to eliminate governmental support programs that now benefit the wealthy at the expense of other persons. POVERTY

"In spite of general affluence in the industrialized nations, the majority of persons in the world live in poverty. In order to provide basic needs such as food, clothing, shelter, education, health care, and other necessities, ways must be found to share more equitably the resources of the world. Increasing technology, when accompanied by exploitative economic practices, impoverishes many persons and makes poverty self-perpetuating. Poverty due to natural catastrophes and environmental changes is growing and needs attention and support. Conflicts and war impoverish the population on all sides, and an important way to support the poor will be to work for peaceful solutions.

"As a church, we are called to support the poor and challenge the rich. To begin to alleviate poverty, we support such policies as: adequate income maintenance, quality education, decent housing, job training, meaningful employment opportunities, adequate medical and hospital care, humanization and radical revisions of welfare programs, work for peace in conflict areas and efforts to protect creation's integrity. Since low wages are often a cause of poverty, employers should pay their employees a wage that does not require them to depend upon government subsidies such as food stamps or welfare for their livelihood.

"Because we recognize that the long-term reduction of poverty must move beyond services to and employment for the poor, which can be taken away, we emphasize measures that build and maintain the wealth of poor people, including asset-building strategies such as individual development savings accounts, micro-enterprise development programs, programs enabling home ownership, and financial management training and counseling. We call upon churches to develop these and other ministries that promote asset-building among the poor. We are especially mindful of the Global South, where investment and micro-enterprise are especially needed. We urge support for policies that will encourage equitable economic growth in the Global South and around the world, providing a just opportunity for all.

"Poverty most often has systemic causes, and therefore we do not hold poor people morally responsible for their economic state." *Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2005-2008*
