As Ryan Althaus, a recent graduate of Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary and "captain" of Team Sweaty Sheep told the Presbyterian News Service, "We all too often forget the interconnectedness of our denomination and our Christian faith as a whole. This is an exciting event during which we can show how close we all really are while at the same time experiencing the uniqueness and individuality of various congregations."

And that is our prayer for this General Assembly. As we give thanks for our interconnectedness through Jesus Christ, may we follow Christ with faith, courage, hope, and trust on this and every leg of our journey.
