## Annual Meeting to Focus on USF&W Plans for Pettaquamscutt Cove

Please join us for the 2011 NRPA Annual Meeting, which will highlight important projects and activities within the Narrow River Watershed. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, October 4th, at the Coastal Institute Auditorium, URI Bay Campus, South Ferry Road, Narragansett. Refreshments will be served at 7:00 p.m. and the meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Our featured speaker will be Janis Nepshinsky, Visitor Services Manager for the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's wildlife refuges in Rhode Island. Janis will discuss plans for the John H. Chafee Refuge at Pettaquamscutt Cove. She is in the discovery and scoping phase of the planning, looking at parcels for hiking trails, benches, kiosks, platforms, environmental education classes and so on, and is interested in forming partnerships with groups in the watershed.

Janis Nepshinsky's career has always been in protecting wildlife places and wildlife, beginning in 1976 at the Hobe Sound National Wildlife Refuge where she researched manatees and sea turtles on the East Coast of Florida. In 1984 she received a Masters in Environmental Engineering from the University of Florida and became the first water quality engineer for the St. John's River Water Management District. She worked for 15 years restoring contaminated lands for wildlife and managing the district's environmental compliance program. In 1999, Janis returned to New England and is currently working as the Visitor Services Manager for the Rhode Island National Wildlife Refuges. In 2005, Janis was given the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's

#### NRPA Awards Four College Scholarships

For the 19th year, NRPA awarded scholarships to seniors graduating from high schools in the Narrow River Watershed.

The scholarships honor deceased NRPA Board Member Lesa Meng, whose husband, Rick Moffitt, established the scholarship fund, enabling NRPA to provide \$1,000 scholarships to seniors graduating from high schools in the Watershed.

Applicants for the scholarships were judged on the quality of an original essay about mitigating the impacts of human activity in the Narrow River Watershed, their participation in environmentally oriented activities in and out of school, a science teacher's recommendation, and academic achievement in science and math courses.

The 2011 Lesa Meng/Narrow River Preservation Association Scholarship recipients are:

#### **Margaret King** North Kingstown High School

Margaret plans to study public health and will be attending Lesley University in Cambridge, Mass. Margaret was a Girl Scout Gold Award recipient; her project consisted of marking storm drains in the

Ouonset Business Park and educating the Victoria Gallogly surrounding community about reducing water pollution. Margaret also organized a clean-up at a saltwater marsh reserve at Quonset Point.

#### Elena Suglia North Kingstown High School

An honor student at NKHS, Elena will attend Brown University in the fall to study marine biology. As a junior, Elena won a scholarship to attend the 7th Annual Land and Water Conservation Summit. an opportunity to learn about environmental issues and conservation projects in New England. As a senior, Elena participated in an internship at the URI Graduate School of Oceanography studying nitrogen conversion rates in bacteria in salt marshes.

#### **Edward Trowbridge** Narragansett High School

Edward was captain of the Narragansett High School Envirothon Team, which participated in a statewide academicbased environmental knowledge competition, leading the team to a second place finish in 2010. Edward plans to attend the University of Vermont to study environmental biology.

#### The Prout School

Victoria was a member of the Prout varsity soccer team and a Girl Scout Silver Award recipient. As part of the Silver Award project at the Charlestown Summer Camp, Victoria planned a sevenweek workshop to teach children why, how and what to recycle. Victoria (below) will major in environmental science at the University of Vermont.

#### **An AWEsome Multiplier Effect**

This year's Watershed Science for Educators course, jointly sponsored by the Wood-Pawcatuck Watershed Association and the NRPA, attracted 21 students, including classroom teachers and environmental educators who gained a deeper understanding of the natural processes of a watershed and the results of human interaction with these processes through many hands-on activities.

The course, which ran from February 2 to April 27 and offered three graduate credits from the URI Feinstein College of Continuing Education, covered topics ranging from early geological processes to recent and predicted global change, based on the best available scientific resources. Each participant received an Active Watershed Education (AWEsome) Narrow River curriculum guide, GIS watershed maps and other resources, along with many interactive classroom lessons. The AWEsome materials are designed for use by grades 4 through 8, but educators of all grades are encouraged to participate and adapt materials to suit their needs.

The reach of this course in promoting watershed protection is very encouraging, says Instructor Denise Poyer of the Wood-Pawcatuck Watershed Association. "In fact, it's awesome," says Denise, who

estimates that the 12 classroom teachers in the course reach more than 800 students each school year, while the nine environmental educators from groups such as Save the Bay reach over 1,000 individuals from Kindergarteners to adults each year.

Participants ranged from 5th grade teachers with multiple subject areas to high school teachers of biology, chemistry, marine biology, environmental science and general science. Their schools are: Coventry High School, Mt. Hope High School, Burrillville High School, Blackrock School, S. D. Barnes Elementary School, Pilgrim High School, Mount Pleasant High School, Remington Middle School, Jamestown Lawn Avenue School, Cranston West High School, and Ponaganset Middle School. Environmental educators were from Save the Bay, Woonosquatucket River Watershed Council, Norman Bird Sanctuary and the Narragansett Bay Estuary Program.

The watershed course usually includes two field trips. "To better understand point and non-point sources of pollution," says Denise, "our first field trip was to the South Kingstown Wastewater Treatment Plant and various sites around Narrow River to look at storm water problems and treatment solutions. For

our *wetlands* field trip, we went to Arcadia Management Area to learn how to do vernal pool assessments and waterquality sampling."

And there were guest speakers. The class had some extra help from Kim Sullivan of RIDEM's Aquatic Education Program and NRPA Board Members Jason Considine, Dr. Jon Boothroyd, Dr. Veronica Berounsky and Annette DeSilva. Annette discussed NRPA's River Watch waterquality monitoring, and Veronica gave a virtual tour of Narrow River and discussed present issues. There were also presentations by Jim Turenne from NRCS about soil science. Shannon McManus from URI Cooperative Extension NEMO program about storm water issues. These were all excellent, says Denise, "but Jon Boothroyd stole the show on the last day of class with his riveting and detailed explanation about global change."

The watershed program was made possible by grants from the Rhode Island Rivers Council to Wood-Pawcatuck and NRPA. "We also had funding from the Lattner Family Foundation, which enabled seven of the teachers to takes their classes on field trips — one went to Narrow River — and the other participants to purchase monitoring equipment."

#### **Pettaquamscutt Paddle Just Keeps Growing**



Here is Mick's take on the Swim:

"A half an hour before the start, a great blue heron lifted off the river as the skies cleared for a beautiful late spring day. A good omen indeed! But we already knew that the Sixth Annual Swim was going to be the Best Yet. That's because we had seen the great work of our committee and our crew of volunteers, and the very gen-

of the more than 100 swimmers agreed that number 6 was indeed the Best Yet.

"Each year, the Swim gives us an opportunity to promote the value of open-water swimming and celebrate the improving quality of the watershed, and support the NRPA's water-monitoring program and its educational initiatives."
