In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people." Luke 2:8-10

During the season of Advent, we prepare and wait for the coming of Christ as a child, even though we know that Christ was born over 2,000 years ago. Advent is a time of great anticipation and hope!

There are times in our lives, when like our Jewish friends, we wonder and even cry out in confusion about Jesus Christ the Messiah. Many times we find ourselves in a waiting pattern of "not yet," which doesn't help us gain clarity or vision for our future.

Often, I ask myself throughout the day, and

especially in the evening as my day winds down...What new places did I see God today? Where has God been with me? How am I bringing God's presence to others?

In what or whom do you place your hope this season? May our hope begin at the manger this year as we humbly come and experience Jesus in new and reconciling ways. Our hope is in Jesus the Christ! O come let us adore him, Jesus Christ the King!

The Fallacy of Joy

My growing up years were filled with temporary moments of happiness mixed with moments of confusion and disappointment. As a child we moved several times and making new friends was not always easy. I was glad to have my six brothers and sister to play with. Being the oldest girl in the family they became a constant source of both frustration and silliness. I was their babysitter, often their only means of transportation, and to some extent their mother when mom went off to the hospital to have more babies. They were my family and no matter how many times we moved they were always there. It was very comforting to me.

Married life and motherhood brought about yet another series of ups and downs and family took on a whole new meaning for me. Life was now filled with not only my own sense of happiness and disappointment but I often internalized my children's happiness and disappointments. As a mom you can't help but be protective knowing full well that you must give your children the chance to make their own mistakes and feel their own pain all the while feeling it right along with them.

So, what does all of this have to do with JOY? I tell you these things to say that life has taught me the difference between JOY and HAPPINESS. Happiness is a fleeting emotion. It is a good emotion and causes us to feel joyful, but true JOY comes from within. It does not fluctuate with current or passing situations. It does not change when life throws you a curve ball. True JOY is based on our identity as a Christ-follower and our relationship to Christ.

Psalm 83 says, "They concoct crafty plans against your own people, they plot against the people you favor." This reminds us that we are God's treasure and that we are cherished. Ephesians 1 says, "We have been ransomed through his Son's blood, and we have forgiveness for our failures based on his overflowing grace, which he poured over us with wisdom and understanding." And, 1 John 1:7 says, "But if we live in the light in the same way as he is in the light, we have

fellowship with each other, and the blood of Jesus, His Son, cleanses us from every sin." This is the reason for our JOY!

Jesus was born in the small town of Bethlehem and his family moved before his second birthday. He went from Bethlehem to Egypt and back to Jerusalem. He spent his adult ministry moving from place to place and He died so that we might have the abundant life we need so that we are free to move about spreading the good news of the gospel.

The facts of the Bible never change. The truth about who we are in Christ never changes. It was never Christ's desire that we be happy because He knew that happiness is fleeting and dependent upon the situations and the people around us. Happiness is an earthly goal. Christ's desire was that we would find JOY in the very word of God, the truth of scripture and the abiding of the Holy Spirit within us.

We are His children, the chosen ones of God. We are holy and blameless in His sight. We live our lives with eternity in mind, not in survival mode, but with the hope that comes through Jesus Christ.

1 Peter says that "on account of his vast mercy, he has given us new birth. You have been born anew into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. You have a pure and enduring inheritance that cannot perish – an inheritance that is presently kept safe in heaven for you."

This is true JOY – living with the knowledge that someday we will move right into our eternal hope with Christ. This same Christ who was born in a manger on Christmas morn will welcome us with open arms as He escorts us into the mansion He has waiting for us.

Celebrate this Advent with JOY in your hearts knowing that the situations and the circumstances that you are facing are wrapped with the JOY of the Lord! He is your strength and your Redeemer.
