From Pastor Barb "What If's"

Have you ever been in a position similar to Martha and Mary? In John chapter 11, we read about their brother, Lazarus, dying. They had sent for Jesus and four days later he finally arrives. "But Lord, if you had been here he wouldn't have died, they exclaimed!"

We have all been on the receiving end of news that we did not want to hear; medical news, family news, relationship news, church news, financial news....the list can go on and on. That is precisely how Martha and Mary felt. Their brother was gone for good and their lives as they had known them were changed and for all practical purposes, over. But, it's not over until God says it's over!

Jesus shows up...four days later, but he showed off his power in a way that had never before been witnessed! He reversed the withered, dead body of Lazarus right before everyone's eyes. Jesus showed us that his power is no match for death.

To appreciate this miracle, we need to understand the ancient Jewish burial traditions. Lazarus was basically buried like a mummy with layers of cloth surrounding his body. It must have been like a full body cast. So how did Lazarus get up and get out of the tomb with a full body cast? Well, to be honest, that had to be a miracle as well...we will call it miracle number two. The first miracle would have been being raised from the dead.

Can you imagine being there and witnessing such an amazing event? Lazarus comes hopping out of the tomb and grieving turns to laughter and they have something to talk about the rest of their lives. I mean, who wouldn't be talking about being raised from the dead after four days? It must have felt pretty hopeless prior to the resurrection of Lazarus. Have you ever thought that this miracle not only foreshadows Jesus' resurrection, but it foreshadows our resurrection and many other resurrections, including the church's resurrection! It is a snapshot of what Jesus wants to do in our lives and in our church right here, right now.

Let's not miss the point. When we sin, it's like the enemy of our very soul wraps us up in grave clothes. Sin buries us alive and makes a mummy out of us. We become only a shadow of the person that we were meant to be. But Jesus calls us out of our tombs. He raises us up and helps us to become the person we are meant to be. After all, every promise that God has ever made is a yes in helping us to follow and become more like Christ.

One of the things that I have found helpful is to personalize scripture. In order to do that we can take Lazarus' name out of the scripture and put our name or another name in its place. For example...Barb...come out! Take a moment and think about what Jesus is calling you out of and into.

Allow yourself some quiet time and listen for God's calling. He's calling you out of sin and death. God is calling us to resurrection! We are resurrection people...so let's tell others all the good things that God is doing in our lives!

Have you had the difficult conversation?

Have you ever heard anyone say, I'm not afraid of death, but I'm afraid of dying? In life we prepare for everything—career, marriage, children, and retirement. In

spite of the conversations we have surrounding these important milestones, only about 30% of us have discussed our end-of-life wishes with family members or other caregivers in spite of the fact that more than 90% of us think it important to do so. Unlike 50 years ago when the average person died of acute conditions without prolonged illness, Americans today are living longer with chronic conditions which often lead to challenges at the end of life. Talking is the single most important thing we can do to prepare for the death of someone we love or for our own death. Often such conversations are avoided out of an understandable desire to spare each other's feelings. That's why it's so important to begin the discussion before it becomes necessary. It is as important as all other life plans we have made. Having a plan in place makes it easier for us. our doctors. and loved ones if we are unable to communicate our health care wishes because of injury or serious illness. By starting early, it is more likely that wishes will be heard and honored

Such a conversation is not likely to take place spontaneously. Whether you are an aging parent or a concerned adult child, make the first move. Seize any opportunity to begin the discussion whether it's bringing up death as part of a general conversation or using a more direct approach. Fifty-three percent of 1,000 Americans polled by the Conversation Project, a Boston-based program dedicated to helping people talk about their wishes for end-of-life care. indicated that they would feel relieved if a loved one initiated such a conversation.

There is no "right" way to start the conversation nor is there a "right" time. We could mention articles about people like Barbara Bush who recently indicated that she will no longer seek treatment and ask what others think about that. Or we might start with some else's experience. "Do you remember what happened to ____ and what his/her family went through? I don't want you to have to go through that with me. That's why I want to talk about this now while we can." In a more direct approach we might say. "I want to talk about how I'd like to be cared for if I was sick or injured" or "If you ever got sick. I don't know what kind of care you would like. Could we talk about this?"

When people do end up having these conversations many find that they weren't as "scary" as they thought they would be. Some even feel relief. Studies show that having end-of-life discussions and knowing that a loved one's wishes were followed often helps families during their time of grieving.

There are numerous resources available to help with planning for end-of-life decisions. Initiate discussing your wishes with your doctors. Get information about advance directives and a medical power of attorney. "Choices-Living Well at the End of Life Advance Directive Packet" is available at www.ohiohospitals.org. "Are Some Conditions Worse than Death?" and "Personal Medical Preferences Test," a couple of the tools offered by www.starttheconversation.org, might prove helpful.

Having these conversations encourages each of us to think about what we want. They can also help us or our loved ones make difficult decisions with less pain, doubt, and anxiety in addition to possibly minimizing conflict within a family when/if the time comes. It means everything to know we have fulfilled our loved one's wishes to the best of our ability. Give this gift to

your loved ones and to yourself.

Miami Valley District UM Men are collecting pill bottle donations. They are sent to Matthew 25 Ministries in Cincinnati.

We probably receive about 3,000 pounds of pill bottles a month. Our Pill Bottle program has grown from a small collection organized by a friend of our Founder and President's living in a local retirement community to a nation-wide program fulfilling the dual needs of improving medical care in developing countries and caring for our environment.

Every pill bottle donated enhances one of these missions and the recycling aspect actually fulfills a dual mission, since it not only rescues plastics from landfills and incineration facilities, it generates cash which goes into our programs. As many as 200 gaylords (4 foot x 4 foot x 4 foot boxes) of pill bottles may be saved from the landfill with every truckload of recyclable chips.

Acceptable collection items include: Prescription Pill Bottles, Over the Counter Pill Bottles, Large Pill Bottles, Small Pill Bottles, Pill Bottles with Secure Caps (child resistant), Pill Bottles without Secure Caps. (Faith Community's Collection containers are under the coat racks as you enter the education wing.)
