From Pastor Barb

The reality is that everyone makes mistakes. The issue isn't whether you will make them; it's what you do about them. It's

whether you will choose the path of humility and courage or the path of ego and pride - Stephen Covey. For two years, I have served as the pastor of Faith Community. I am human and I have made some mistakes along the way. With a humble heart, it has been my intent to do no harm, to do good, and to stay in love with God. Three simple rules that are engrained in the Weslevan and Methodist tradition. Just let me say, if I have caused pain, I apologize and am truly sorry, it was not my intent. I pray that we can be a forgiving church and love one another as Christ loves us.

I believe that we must move forward, for we, together, are the body of Christ and find our common ground in the grace and love of Jesus and the Savior

that we serve. I am reminded that it is in our brokenness and humility that the light of Christ can truly shine through. We are like a beautiful stain glass picture where the light shines through the broken and cut pieces of glass, giving us a beautiful picture of the One that puts us all together. Romans 8:28 tells us, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose."

I love to read and usually have several books that I am reading at any given time. One author, Stephen Covey, has written several books that I have found to be helpful in church growth and personal growth that I would like to share with you.

Below are 10 quotes from Stephen Covey that have the power to completely change the direction of one's life, and I believe the direction of our relationships in our church.

1) The key is not to prioritize what's on your schedule, but to schedule your priorities.

2) The main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing.

3) Live out of your imagination, not your history.

4) Trust is the glue of life. It's the most essential ingredient in effective communication. It's the foundational principle that holds all relationships.

5) Most of us spend too much time on what is urgent and not enough time on what is important.

6) I am not a product of my circumstances. I am a product of my decisions.

7) You have to decide what your highest priorities are and have the courage pleasantly, smilingly, unapologetically, to say "no" to other things. And the way you do that is by having a bigger "yes" burning inside. The enemy of the "best" is often the "good."

8) I teach people how to treat me by what I will allow.

9) Love is a verb. Love – the feeling – is the fruit of love the verb or our loving actions, so love.

10) Live, love, laugh, leave a legacy.

In reading these quotes, and understanding that there is power in forgiveness, I pray that we are all touched by the power of the Holy Spirit, that Faith Community UMC will be the church that God calls us to be in our brokenness and humility through forgiveness and as the body of Christ move forward into God's future.

Everyone falls down, but it is in getting back up that is how we begin to walk again...Psalm 37:23-24 tells us..."A person's steps are made secure by the LORD when they delight in his way. Though they trip up, they won't be thrown down, because the LORD holds their hand." May God bless us for each step of our journey as the body of Christ. ~Pastor Barb

Stephen Ministry Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart:

How to Relate to Those Who Are Suffering Shel Silverstein's poem "Helping" describes two very different kinds of help:

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And some kind of help Is the kind of help That helping's all about

And some kind of help Is the kind of help We can all do without.

Kenneth C. Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist who is the founder and Executive Director of Stephen Ministries in St. Louis, Missouri and the author of Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart, experienced both kinds of "help" in the months before and after his wife's death. He learned first-hand a great deal about what is and what is not helpful when one is hurting. During times of suffering, everyone intends to help. No one tries to add to another's hurt. We look for ways to comfort, express our concern, and love. And, if we are the person who is hurting, we hope others will console. comfort. care. and love us when we feel the most vulnerable. Haugk recognizes that at some point each of us fails to be the kind of caregiver we'd like to be. As a

result of his experiences, he determined to do all that he could to alleviate some of the pain of suffering by "heading off the hurtful and promoting the helpful" when he wrote this book.

The writers of the Bible were aware of our tendency to add to the pain of those we really want to help. One proverb especially speaks to this:

Like one who takes away a garment on a cold day, or like vinegar poured on soda,

is one who sings songs to a heavy heart. –Proverbs 25:20

This proverb, as true today as when it was written, indicates that we can actually increase a suffering person's pain with misdirected care. With the best of intentions we can add to another's problems. Since suffering people are so fragile, those who relate to them must relate with sensitivity and compassion. In Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart, Haugk offers suggestions not only about what not to say and do but offers

suggestions about what we can say and do.

Haugk reminds us that one of the great truths about relating to those who are suffering is that nobody does it perfectly. God continues to call imperfect people to reach out and do the best we can. Recognizing this frees us to care even as we grow in learning how to be more effective care givers. As Christians, we are called to bring hope and compassion during times of suffering. No one should hurt alone. That's why we have Stephen Ministry! Faith Community UMC desires to be a place where no one has to hurt alone.
