In many Christian churches, the Advent season is ushered in with readings from the prophet Isaiah who foretells the good news of the coming of Christ. But Isaiah also has some bad news for God's people: God says he is disgusted by their lack of compassion, but that he longs to bless them:

"If you do away with the yoke of oppression, with the pointing finger and malicious talk, and if you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry

and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday." (Isaiah 58: 9b-11, NIV)

Who are the oppressed among us? Consider our friends at El Buen Pastor, the hard-working immigrants who live on as little as \$300 a week...for a family of 5 or 6...with 2 adults working! As I have come to know them I have seen that they suffer many injustices. They escaped from broken economies, failed governments, gang warfare and generations of severe poverty. Here in their new home they have been met with prejudice, racial profiling, hate and exploitation...but they are grateful to be here.

I have had the privilege of learning from the families of El Buen Pastor what it means to embrace hope...hope for a better life, hope for a good future for their children, hope for justice.

This Advent season will you join me in asking God to give us the courage to lift the yoke of oppression, in preparation for the coming of Christ?
