As a guest contributor to the newsletter, I thought I would share a moment in my life when I knew God was watching over me. Now, start singing to yourself, "All night, all day, angels watching over me, my Lord," and get ready to jump back in time. In 2008, I moved to the Mississippi Delta and lived in a UMC parsonage 37.2 miles from the "Crossroads", where the famed Robert Johnson supposedly sold his soul to the devil. In this very small Delta town everyone knew everyone, and they already knew me as the new leader in the UM Church and campus ministry. I knew that if I was to have a sip of anything other than water, then I would need to be very discreet, especially in a town where you could not buy wine on Sundays (still!). Everyone at the church had told me about the one store in the town to go to, but one day I drove past a store on the other side of town and decided to stop in.

Standing behind the counter reading a newspaper, the gentleman had warm eyes and a shocked look at my entrance. Not bothered, just a little like, "huh, who are you?" I was the only customer in the shop and I greeted him with eye contact and a smile, and then went about my business. I don't remember what I was looking for, but I do remember asking questions about this and that, trying to be friendly without becoming a nuisance.

Then another gentleman entered and walked directly to the counter. I wouldn't have noticed, except the thud of the item that he placed on the counter was definitely not the timbre of a bottle of liquid. It was a more metallic, heavy sound of an item wrapped in a cloth. I looked up because it's hard not to pay attention, but I saw the eyes of the shop attendant change and glance from me to the other gentleman. The back of my neck started to tense, telling me that I may have stumbled into the wrong place at the wrong time. I turned my back to them so they would know that I was not involved. I tried to appear nonchalant as I made mental notes of the scene, including physical descriptions of the men, just in case. The other gentleman quickly left, and the cloth wrapped item was carefully placed behind the counter by the shopkeeper. When it felt like an appropriate time to approach the counter, I walked forward thinking that if I became a paying customer minding my own business, then I could keep up the appearance that everything was just fine.

I remember the secure feeling of driving away, knowing that even though I was the only one in my car, I was not alone. God protected me in that moment from harm, from injury, and from really God only knows what. I think about that encounter with God's protection and provision over my life and continue to be overwhelmed with gratitude for being watched over by an ever present God. "All night, all day, angels watching over me, my Lord."

Church Council Report

The Church Council has been busy this summer taking care of our buildings and operating systems. As you know, we have replaced our troubled piano and completed a cleanup of the Church and parsonage grounds. We are in the process of preparing the parsonage as a rental property while we are between pastors. We are updating our sound system and our WiFi system. Our goal is to make our buildings and systems appealing to potential candidates for the pastor position and to prospective new members.

We need your help. We need help finding a new pastor and a new pianist. Our new District Superintendent has given us permission to try to find candidates for the pastor's position. If you have any contacts or ideas of people who might be interested in this position, please let Patty or Beth know. We are also still looking for a pianist. We have been fortunate to have Sylvianne and Sandy help us out this summer, but we would like to hire a pianist who can play for all our services and accompany the choir. Again, if you know of anyone we can reach out to, please let us know.

We also need help on Sunday mornings. We need people who are willing to usher, count the offering and serve as liturgists. These jobs are all fairly simple and we do have trainings for each job. For example, the ushers arrive at 10:00am to greet people as they enter the church, especially visitors. They light the candles and collect the offering. We also need people to provide flowers each week and help with coffee hour on the first Sunday. We don't have anyone signed up for August!

It is also time to be thinking about changes in church leadership. One third of the church council rotates off each year, which means we need new members each year. If you are interested in being on the council, or in helping on Sunday mornings, please let Beth know (541-760-3021).

Thank you for all you do for our Church. We are a small but mighty congregation.
