#### **Carol's Comments**

I've been thinking... about

Epiphany. We are beginning the third phase of the Advent-Christmas-

Epiphany liturgical cycle. Advent focused our attention on the coming of Christ and our preparation for that coming into our lives one more time. Christmas celebrates that coming and Epiphany focuses our attention on new life, lived with the renewal of Christ in our lives. The liturgical color is green for growth. The first Sunday is Epiphany Day - the 12th Day of Christmas - when we celebrate the coming of the Wise Men (or Kings) to pay homage to Jesus. The following Sunday, we fast-forward to the Baptism of the Lord. The remaining Sundays of Epiphany move us through ways in which we can grow in faith.

Growing in faith includes putting into practice The Gift of Christmas: Love. God's love for the world is revealed in and through the coming of Jesus into the world. How we live-out the receiving of that love takes many expressions.

The Social Principles are practical expressions of our living God's love in the world, as United



Methodist Christians. To help guide our thinking and acting about how we live in, and are engaged in ministry in the world, The United Methodist Church has created

statements to guide the church in its efforts to create a world of justice.

The United Methodist Church believes God's love for the world is an active and engaged love, a love seeking justice and liberty. We cannot just be observers. So

we care enough about people's lives to risk interpreting God's love, to take a stand, to call each of us into a response, no matter how controversial or complex. The church helps us think and act out a faith perspective, not just responding to all the other 'mind-makers-up' that exist in our society. '(From the Book of Resolutions 2016)

The Social Principles are a prayerful and thoughtful effort of the General Conference to speak to the issues in the contemporary world from a sound biblical and theological foundation. The Preamble states: We affirm our unity in Jesus Christ while acknowledging differences in applying our faith in different cultural contexts as we live out the gospel. The Social Principles address 6 areas of expression of "active and engaged love". First: The Natural World. All creation is the Lord's, and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it; Second: The Nurturing Community. We believe we have a responsibility to innovate, sponsor, and evaluate new forms of community that will encourage development of the fullest potential in individuals; Third: The Social Community. We affirm all persons as equally valuable in the sight of God's sight. We reject discrimination and assert the rights of minority groups to equal opportunities; Fourth: The Economic Community. We claim all economic systems to be under the judgment of God no less than other facets of the created order'; Fifth: The Political Community. We hold governments responsible for the protection of people's basic freedoms. We believe that neither church nor state should attempt to dominate the other; and Sixth: The World Community. God's world is one world. We pledge ourselves to seek the meaning of the gospel in all issues that divide people and threaten the growth of world community.\*

Consider each area: What might you do during Epiphany to grow in faith that expresses God's love active and involved in the world? Showing by your actions that you care enough about people's lives to risk interpreting God's love, to take a stand, to call yourself and each of us into a response, no matter how controversial or complex.

#### Why Become a Pastor? (Part 3 of 3) By Trisha Holden

Much of the discussion as a candidate explores their Call surrounds the question "Why become a pastor?" If God calls and equips all of us to serve God and share God's love with those around us, and shows us how in many meaningful ways as lay people, why invest in an expensive education, and go through the bother of jumping through the hoops to become ordained, when we can do God's work as our own selves?

My answer to that has been, up until recently, "I can actually serve the ways I want to serve by being my own self." My answer has been "not yet." I considered my main ministry to be as active and involved parent in my kids' lives as I could be. While I was raising my kids, I also taught preschool, worked at a bank, and worked at the schools and volunteered in many roles at the church.

Last year, I was in the high school office, and I was especially mindful of kids I'd taught preschool to as they were going through high school. I was their Head Start teacher when they were four. What I saw from the high school office was kids and families who were still struggling with the same issues 10-14 years later. Poverty was affecting every facet of their lives. They were struggling socially and academically. I saw that they were hurting. I wanted (still want) to do something to help. More than offer a kind word from the nice lady in the office. I want to be part of the solution. I know our church as a local congregation, and as a global whole is committed to social justice issues. I know we want to make a positive difference in the lives of kids and families in our community, and world. I want to be a part of that. I don't want to just observe and take note and be kind and share love and compassion in a passing way. I want to dive in and help find the root of the hurt, and work toward healing and help families operate from a place of health and wholeness so that we might break the cycles of poverty and abuse. It's too big of a job for "just me". But if I can be the person described in Wesley's and Jesus' descriptions of who a follower of Christ is; if I can be found to be fit and worthy to serve as a member of the United Methodist clergy, it may just feel possible to share God's abundant love in a way that makes a real difference in the lives of those who are hurting. This is my wish and my prayer. I was asked by a member of the DCOM "why now?" My "why now" is because the need is there, and my desire to help is bigger than ever before.

One of my most influential pastors, Jeff Strobel, taught me that "a Calling is when a person's gifts and passions meet the needs of the world." My gifts include compassion and kindness. The world needs those in spades. I would like to share my gifts in the biggest way I know how. I know God is laughing when we make plans, but my "dream ministry setting" would be to spend the school year working within the school system (because that's where kids spend so much time) helping meet the emotional, social and spiritual needs of kids and their families; and spend my summers at camp because that's where I know from experience that wholeness can be experienced. Between now and my potential future ordination, I continue to look for ways I can be in ministry in my daily life, and I am excited about the opportunities I've been given to do so this year at school and at camp, and at home.

### **RECIPE CORNER**

#### **Cheesy Ham and Hash Brown Casserole**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1 (32 ounce) package frozen hash brown potatoes
- 8 ounces cooked, diced ham
- 3 green onions, diced
- 2 (10.75 ounce) cans condensed cream of potato soup
- 1 (16 ounce) container sour cream
- 2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
- 1 1/2 cups grated Parmesan cheese

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly grease a 9 x 13 inch baking dish.
- 2. In a large bowl, mix hash browns, ham, green onions, cream of potato soup, sour cream, and Cheddar cheese. Spread evenly into prepared dish. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Salt and pepper to taste, if desired.
- 3. Bake 1 hour in the preheated oven, or until bubbly and lightly brown.

Makes 12 servings.

This is a great New Year's morning breakfast or brunch casserole. You can prepare it the night before and pop it in the oven the next morning.
