From Our Shared Heart...



Over the past month, I have been on two different Zoom series for pastors focused on faith and politics. Even though talking about "sex, religion, and politics" has been considered taboo in polite company, since I became your pastor about 16 months ago, shortly after my arrival, we've already had to "take our gloves off," so to speak, and talk frankly and openly about sex to appropriately process what we are called to take as our faithful response to the daunting challenges of ensuring inclusion of the LGBTQIA+ community in the United Methodist Church.

Now, it's that time-Election Day. Election season in a deeply divided culture and country. Divided families, divided communities, divided churches.

The easiest approach, of course, would be to say nothing. After all, we don't talk politics in church, right? There is the separation of Church and State that many of our ancestors helped create as they immigrated from religious oppression, coming here because of the religious freedom they held as a high value and priority in their new lives in a strange land. There are legalities constraining partisan politics in a taxexempt 5013C organization.

As I sit with my responsibilities as your pastor in this deepening and widening socio-political crisis of our times, I feel deeply that I do have a commitment, because of my call, to deal with these challenges with as much directness, integrity, courage, and compassion as I can muster. From our online resource Amplify Media, specializing in Christian education and spiritual formation resources based on the Wesleyan tradition, I am watching three Zoom ses-

sions on "Justice, Love and Humility: Pastoring a Divided Culture." The sessions are: (1) How Did We Get Here? Exploring the Roots of Our Division; (2) Courage and Compassion: Preaching A Prophetic Message; and (3) Grace-filled Accountability: Holding Our Communities Together.

From Luther Seminary's Faith + Lead series, I've participated in four sessions by Zoom on "Finding Hope in a Divided Country: Election Edition," led by Rev. Angela Denker. The sessions are (1) Surprise, (2) Warning, (3) Opportunity, and (4) Hope. She is a former sportswriter turned Lutheran pastor, writer, speaker—and wife and mom of two little boys-based in Minneapolis. Denker is a contributor to various publications, including The Washington Post, Sports Illustrated, Christian Century, and Living Lutheran. Her first book, Red State Christians: Understanding the Voters Who Elected Donald Trump, was released August 6, 2019 by Fortress Press.

My intention is to preach about faith and politics on the Sundays in November following the election and until the first Sunday of Advent on Thanksgiving weekend. I am committed to doing my best to be as non-partisan as I can, as well as support healthy dialogue and Christian conversation in our congregation.

In addition, I am offering three group sessions for "holy conversation" and Christian

conferencing by Zoom for those of you who are interested in participating to process and reflect on the outcome of the 2020 election. I have asked Rev. Bert Schniepp as well as Jim and Kathy Waterman to both watch the Amplifv resources from our denomination and to help me with "anchoring" these sessions with pastoral presence. As most of you know, Bert is a retired UM Elder, and Jim was ordained in the American Baptist church. If you like, we can discuss my sermon from the previous Sunday as well as how the election consequences are unfolding. If you are interested in participating in these discussion sessions, please let me know by emailing me at revdrkarenlove@gmail.com. We will negotiate the best day and time for those pre-registering.

I am looking forward to sharing this time with you to talk about "what is" and how we can respond faithfully. Some of the challenges before us:

- How can our church hold space for multiple views without holding space for harm?

- How can we disagree without becoming enemies?

- How do we transform our fears into opportunities for being light in the world?

The emergency Cold Weather Shelter has been wondering what to do. With COVID-19, it is not safe to have a dozen or more people sleeping in the Presbyterian Church fellowship hall. Fortunately, Lane County has agreed to loan the Emergency Shelter 21 small, portable cabins. Each cabin, or pod, has a bed and built-in shelves. The plan is to set these up on the Presbyterian church property and leave them there until spring. However, they will only be occupied during cold weather. When the Emergency Shelter is open, volunteers also provide a hot dinner and breakfast, usually cooked in the Presbyterian church kitchen. The Shelter could still use donations for porta-potties, a wash station, fencing, and PPE. Donations can be sent to Florence Emergency Shelter, PO Box 659, Florence, OR 97439.

Can you remember what you were doing a year ago at this time? Recently, with our new normal of Covid-19 protocols, it is almost difficult to remember what day of the week it is. So when my daughter-in-law's birthday came around on October 14th, I was blown away to remember that I had been with Miley in Southern India, celebrating her birthday on a mission trip a year ago. Frankly it seems a lot longer than a year ago! Nevertheless, the memories came flooding back, with a little help from Facebook memories. ...LOL!

On that trip we worked with a team of doctors and nurses, and other professionals, from Developing Workers, a Christian organization, to assess children's medical, social, and emotional well-being who were being sponsored by One Child Matters, India. I was with Miley, who is the CEO of Brave Global, and her team. We were providing an educational component that would be identifying children who were at risk and leaving them with booklets for male and female children. The identified children would be in support groups led by Indian nationals over the course of months, after we left. So I had never been on a mission trip before and it was amazing, difficult, hard work, and rewarding...

Recipe Corner Gallegos Family Turkey Stuffing (For 12 to 16 pound turkey)

Ingredients:

- 8 oz Box Saltine crackers (process into fine crumbs)
- 1 1/2 Cups raisins
- 1 1/2 Cups Longhorn cheddar cheese (mild), cubed into about 1/4" cubes.
- 1 11 oz Can Green Giant Niblets Corn (drained)
- 2 Eggs beaten with 2 to 3 tablespoons of milk
- 1 1/2 Cups diced celery
- 1 Cup diced onion
- 1/4 Cup parsley minced
- 1 1/2 to 2 Cups Best Foods Mayonnaise

Directions:

- \Rightarrow Sauté celery, onion and parsley lightly until onion is translucent.
- $\Rightarrow~$ In large mixing bowl mix all ingredients with mayon naise until it holds together.
- \Rightarrow Stuff turkey.
- \Rightarrow Bake according to the "Stuffed Bird" directions on the bird wrapper.
- $\Rightarrow~$ If you do not want to use all the mayonnaise, add 1/2 mayonnaise and 1/2 cream. I use $\frac{1}{2}$ & $\frac{1}{2}$.
- $\Rightarrow~$ Stuffing tastes best if cooked in bird. Use both body and neck cavities of turkey.

Our Own Florence United Methodist Women's Scholarship Recipient

Gertrude Boyd Crane was an Ordained Elder in our Conference, a theologian and professor at Pacific University, known by her students as a teacher, counselor, and one who helped out financially at critical times in her students' lives.

In her will, she created a scholarship fund for women in the Oregon-Idaho Conference who are taking post-graduate studies toward a profession in the Church. Since 1978 United Methodist Women have awarded almost 100 scholarships to outstanding women, many of whom are serving the Church here in the Oregon-Idaho Conference today.

At the annual meeting of the Oregon-Idaho UMW on October 17 (conducted on Zoom) it was announced that this year's recipient of the Gertrude Boyd Crane scholarship is Florence's own Tia Leonard-Durrant.

Tia shared that she is going to school at Claremont School of Theology working toward getting her Master's of Divinity degree and then will continue to work toward Ordination in the United Methodist Church. She would love to someday be part of church revitalization or maybe even planting a church. She knows she is passionate about figuring out how to help people connect with their communities. What exactly that looks like remains to be seen. Right now Tia is taking Hebrew Bible in Context, Religious Education, and Spiritual Practice Formation with Hebrew Bible in Context being her favorite. Tia is very grateful to have received this scholarship because in addition to the financial help, she knows she has the ongoing care and support of the United Methodist Women of the Oregon-Idaho Conference.

Because of the Coronavirus pandemic, Tia is taking all of her classes online and working from her home here in Florence that she shares with her wife Erin Leonard-Durant and their two dogs. It is ironic that Tia wants to someday help people connect with their communities and yet hasn't been able to become fully involved in the life of the Florence community because of the Covid-19 restrictions.

Congratulations to you Tia for earning this scholarship! The love, prayers, and support of the FUMC congregation are with you. We hope you can feel these things even if we can't be together in person during these challenging days.
