FROM OUR SHARED HEART...

Greetings, brothers and sisters in Christ! I am writing this newsletter from the Leadership Institute 2019 at Church of the Resurrection, Leawood, Kansas, jus

urrection, Leawood, Kansas, just outside Kansas City. Along with 2,500 clergy and laity from more than 1,300 United Methodist churches across the United States, my husband Alan and I just listened to a panel of five bishops (Cynthia Fierro Harvey, Sue Haupert-Johnson, Mike McKee, and Sally Dyck) talking about possible impacts of the major proposals for resolving our denominational crisis that will be considered at General Conference in May. 2020. We had just heard proponents of the Indianapolis Plan and the Next Generation UMC plan. We heard that no matter our stance in United Methodism, (Traditionalist, Centrist, or Progressive) the shared sense that we are all feeling is this: "it is time for something new," in this difficult but defining moment in the life of our Church. "We must either walk together loosely or part with a blessing."

Earlier this morning, after an address by Bishop Kenneth Carder, President of the Council of Bishops, we heard about our denominational struggles toward inclusivity and away from racism and sexism from clergywomen, Yvette Moore, the Communications Director of the UMW, and Junius Dotson, the General Secretary of the Board of Discipleship. There is still much to be done, much to repent in the areas of our racism and sexism. The current cutting edge is the harm being done to

LGBTQIA+ persons by our stance on human sexuality. Tomorrow we will be hearing from more bishops, including our own Bishop Elaine

Stanovsky. We will be meeting with our Annual Conferences to organize and strategize.

As we have listened, my overwhelming feeling is gratitude for you, for this amazing "little but mighty" United Methodist Church in Florence. There are so many churches across our country that are not even discussing yet our denominational crisis, so great is the fear of conflict, of loss. There are numerous churches with a 50-50% or 60-40% split. There is much angst, anxiety, pain and conflict. I am so blessed to be your pastor in times such as these. Not only have we had three well-attended All-Church meetings for prayerful spiritual discernment, discussion, and sharing of information, but we are nearly unanimous in our opposition and resistance to the outcomes of General Conference 2019. You have no idea how rare a bird we are!

Thank you for being willing to share in Christian conversation, "holy conferencing." Thank you for taking seriously the call of Jesus Christ on our lives and especially to seek out, include and be a stand for those on the margins. Thank you for sharing this journey of faith with me.





Items must be stamped \$\frac{2}{2}\$ \$\frac{2}{2}\$ & presorted by BOTH shape & number (up to 4 bags).



- Items must be clean and dry.
- Remove decals & adhesive labels. Labels not printed on must be removed.

If you are interested in helping on Oct. 27, contact Patt Rollins or Vicki Philben What and how to save for the plastic collection:

Containers must be clean and free of debris. Remove all adhesive labels. Acceptable containers have a resin code. Some resin codes are difficult to read.

- \Rightarrow #2 Bottles and jugs (HDPE)
- ⇒ #2 Tubs and lids (HDPE)
- ⇒ #4 Lids, tubs bottles and jugs (LDPE)
- ⇒ #5 Tubs, jugs, bottles, lids (PP)

Beware of the Look a-likes! Some #1s look JUST like #2s, #4s or #5s! Several product bottles that have typically been #2 or #5 in the past, are now showing up in a #1 resinnot recyclable in this collection; #2 tubs and #5 tubs are virtually indistinguishable; and packaging materials of your favorite products change without warning. Always check the #number!

Pay attention to preparation instructions. All materials will be screened by your community collector. If materials are not #2s, #4s or #5s, if they are dirty, incorrectly sorted or prepared, they will be returned to you for disposal.

Q. What about adhesive labels? A. Some paper and plastic labels require soaking. The best method is to apply a generous coating of cooking oil to the label and let it sit overnight. By morning it is easier to remove the label. Wipe away the oil and remaining adhesive. Any tubs or jugs that have 'heat stamped' labels (e.g. laundry detergent) cannot be and do not need to be removed. Clear labels like those found on shampoo bottles need to be removed. Some yogurt cups have shrink wrapped labels. Check carefully.

Q. What about Trays? A. Trays are not on our acceptable list because most are #1 or #6. However there are a few #2, #4, or #5 trays showing up lately. If you encounter these, we can accept them in the appropriate numbered tub collection.

Q. How do I identify whether it's a bottle or a tub? A. Bottles have a threaded neck and threaded cap. Bottles have a center seam across the bottom. Tubs have a center dimple or indentation on the bottom. **Separate** #2 tubs from #2 bottles.
