Our FISH mission project is now completed. We collected mainly food items. We collected 60 cans, 41 boxes, 11 bags, and 7 snack-pack items of food. There were 3 bottles of salad dressings, 1 container of coffee, and 1 powdered drink item. One package of toilet paper was also included. The FISH volunteers were very thankful for all the items. Seeing their pantry and the organization involved was an eye-opener.

The Third Sunday Ingathering Offering for October was \$75.00 and will be donated to First Call for Help.

The Operation Christmas Child (OCC) mission began Sunday, October 18. The Shoeboxes are available under the display table on the landing in front of the sanctuary. Thank you to Tevin, Heidi, and the Youth Fellowship for putting the boxes together. The boxes will remain available thru November 7 and are due back November 8 thru 15. During our Sunday Service on October 18 we saw a video with a spiritual impact story from a young man who had received one of these boxes as a child. There were many stories shared by local workers at the training session I attended.

One story was about a young boy who opened his box and found multiple colorful socks. It is unusual that a box so singularly packed would have made it through a processing center without being repacked with a variety of items. This repacking was attested to by a gentleman at our session who volunteers each year at one of the processing centers, but somehow it made it through. One of the leaders at the OCC celebration saw the young boy and the box and tried to exchange it for another box. The boy held it tightly to his chest and wanted to keep it. He pulled up his pant legs and showed the leader his ankles and feet which had been badly scarred by a fire. He was overjoyed at receiving the socks. He also received a second box.

A 14-year-old boy in Honduras attended an OCC celebration but when the boxes were handed out, he refused it saying there was nothing in there he wanted. He had recently been orphaned and was still very sad about this. A leader convinced him to take a box. A note inside was signed by a couple from the United States. He wrote to them and thanked them for the gifts. They wrote back and a relationship continued. They were childless. They were eventually able to adopt this boy and brought him to the United States. That which he most wanted was in that box, a randomly selected box in a foreign country. How does this happen?

A little girl in Ukraine found a Barbie in her box. Her village was extremely poor and very remote, so this was a cherished item. She decided to share her Barbie with other little girls in her village, each playing with Barbie for a day then passing her on. The boxes and the scripture stories are making a difference in people's lives.

There is good work going on in our church, in our community, in our country, and around the world. Thank you Church.
