# St. Paul's News ~ January 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Each year at Charge Conference, pastors are asked to prepare a Pastor's Report that summarizes their experience in ministry in the previous year. I always like to share this report with the entire church congregation. Below is the report I submitted to our District in November of 2020.

Jeremiah 29:11 For surely | know the plans | have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. 12 Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, | will hear you. 13 When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, 14 | will let you find me, says the LORD, and | will restore your fortunes and gather you from all the nations and all the places where | have driven you, says the LORD, and | will bring you back to the place from which | sent you into exile.

The year 2020 has been unlike any year that I have lived in my 45 years on this planet. Serving as a pastor in the year 2020 has been unlike any that I have served in my brief four-year career as a pastor.

None of the plans that I made for 2020 came to fruition, at least not in the way that they were originally planned. In person worship was interrupted. Christian education was interrupted. Small groups were interrupted. Church traditions were interrupted. Life was interrupted.

There is a saying in the church; a saying that has actually become sort of a joke in church circles. "This is how we have always done it." The year 2020 has proven that the church will continue to minister to all in ways that we have NEVER done it. When pressed into the most unusual circumstances the church has remained able and (mostly) willing to do whatever it took to make ministry happen.

Pastors adapted when they were thrust into online ministry. AV people stepped up and took the lead to make sure that online worship could happen in a meaningful way. Church leaders adapted to be sure that administrative tasks could be cared for. Church staff adapted and turned their homes into offices so that congregations and pastors could be supported. Families adapted as dining room tables turned into offices and school rooms. Congregation members adapted as their lives were turned upside down and they were forced to look for new ways that God was moving in their lives and in the life of the church.

It has not been easy. There have been days that have been beyond difficult and there were moments that I wondered if anyone knew what would happen next. Then I turned to the words of Jeremiah 29:11 and remembered that God knew what would come and I had to ease into the future with the promise that God had a plan for prosperity of health and life and that God's plan included limitless hope.

There have been tears this year. There have been frustrations. There have been moments that were almost too much. But there has also been joy and laughter. There has been excitement. There have been moments of remembrance at funerals, as well as baptisms and confirmations celebrated outdoors where we could be safe. There have been great reminders that the church was never closed, in fact, the church was opened in ways never seen before. Praise God for God's plans! I am grateful that we are turning the page onto January 2021; however, I also acknowledge that turning that page does not automatically change the circumstances we are currently living in. However, I know that God's mercies are new every day and I am beyond grateful for that. I look forward to all of the ministry opportunities that lay before our congregation in 2021. God's blessings be with you as the new year begins.
