"Who Do You Think You Are?

Have you seen the television show "Who Do You Think You Are?" It is a series that takes celebrities on a journey to find out who they are by exploring their history and family genealogy. Often, the celebrity is surprised by something they learn about their family history. Sometimes we all think we know who we are, but there are things that get "forgotten" throughout time. I recently took a Wesleyan History course as part of my course of study classes. There were things that I learned about our Methodist history that were surprising to me. It was like a special Methodist episode of "Who Do You Think You Are".

When we trace our roots back to the very beginning, it gives us a more well-rounded idea of who we are. Our roots can be traced back to John and Charles Wesley and their band of friends who sought reform from within the church. They blazed a trail for all of us. They sought religious freedom, seeking to separate the church from the power of the monarchy. Because of their bravery, Methodism began as a movement that would catch fire and spread across the ocean into the newly settled colony of America.

What began as a band of like-minded individuals has evolved into the global denomination that we are today. United Methodists count for more than 12 million people all around the world. We don't all speak the same language or practice the same cultural traditions, but we are connected by a common mission and history.

Our five-church cooperative parish is living out the connection in a way that very much mimics our history. Historically, parishes across a region would share a Methodist circuit rider (an ordained individual who could perform the sacraments for a local congregation). These local congregations would serve in ministry in their region, led by strong lay persons who cared for others, prayed for each other, and continued the ministry of Jesus Christ. The traveling elder would share their time between these congregations, traveling between them on horseback.

One of the strengths of the United Methodist church is our connection to others. Because of this connection, we can participate in ministries across the globe. We continue to live out our history and the mission that John and Charles Wesley dreamed for Methodists when we recognize that we are part of something much bigger than our individual churches and ourselves. We are partners with millions of others in mission fields across the world. Praise to the God who continues to meet us in the mission field and who directs our work!

Pastor's Letter-What's in a Name?

The Bible tells us that God calls us by name (Isaiah 43:1) and that "A Good name is more desirable than great riches" (Proverbs 22:1a). Names are important. Even Juliet realized the importance of names as she questioned "What's in a name?"

Names identify us and describe us. We call ourselves Christians to demonstrate to others that we are a people who follow Christ—a people who love.

In the Bible, God often renamed people after significant events in their faith journey Abraham became Abraham after God made his covenant with him and Jacob became Israel after wrestling with God in the darkness.

After four months in connection with each other, we find ourselves in search of a name—or at least a better name than the Seneca-Wyandot Cooperative Parish. A name that identifies us and describes us as a group of Christians and as a body of churches in ministry together—a name that will clearly show other people who we are on this faith journey that we are taking together.

That is where you come in—we need you to send us your name suggestions, along with an explanation of your choice so that we can offer everyone an opportunity to decide on a name. For example, the six-church cooperative in the Upper Sandusky area calls themselves Upper River Ministries.

Greetings from St. Paul's Missions Committee:

The Sharing Kitchen mission is still going on and from the look of the table in the sanctuary, appears to be doing well. We have been notified that the DeMolay which is a youth group associated with the Masonic Lodge has collected money which they would like to donate to this mission. Carter Lindhorst is the leader of the Chapter, and this is their current community service project. We would like to thank them for assisting us in this project and know the Sharing Kitchen will put their efforts to good use. We are still collecting nonperishable food items to be distributed to their clients and items for their Christmas party. Lists of recommended items can be obtained from the church office.

Operation Christmas Child was initiated October 17. The Shoeboxes can be picked up on the landing in front of the sanctuary and a few are at the back of the sanctuary. Directions are contained in a pamphlet inside the box. \$9 in postage is required to process and mail each box. This fee includes a New Testament which will be included with each box in the language of the recipient. 9.1 million shoeboxes were distributed in 2020. There is a template for a letter which can be included in the shoebox laid out with the display on the landing table. This letter or a simple note can be included in the box. The boxes can be brought back to church services or dropped off at the church office. I will be taking them to the local collection center November 15-21.

The Third Sunday Ingathering offering was \$80 and will be sent to First Call for Help in Tiffin. They provide a variety of services and with the season changing this will soon include assistance with heating.

The Lunch Bunch went to Fort Ball Pizza on October 28th. Carol Graham was the host. Everyone is welcome. This group meets on the last Tuesday of the month, usually at noon and visits local restaurants. A reservation with the church office or the host is requested so that the restaurant can better prepare for us.

Our final mission for the year will be the Angel Tree which will be going up in November. We will be asking for clothing items for children and teens up to 3x. The clothing can be placed in a regular bag, it should not be wrapped. The limit per item is \$20. This mission is done in collaboration with the Salvation Army. Please have them turned in by December 13th.
