Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As I write these words, we have just begun a new sermon series, entitled "The Discipleship Five". We are renewing our commitment to live as disciples of Christ, to live out our lives reflecting the life of Jesus. That is a tall order! That is why we re-visit the topic of discipleship regularly, as Jesus set a high bar for us to strive toward.

The Discipleship Five addresses ways in which we worship, grow through study, serve, give, and share. We are called to worship God, to study God's word, to serve God's people, to give to God's missions and to share how God has changed our lives.

We have asked ourselves how we would evaluate our Christian Discipleship through the lens of Luke 9:23 where Jesus tells us that His followers must deny themselves, take up their cross daily and follow Him.

Lent is the perfect time for us to re-center ourselves on Christ and His earthly life and death and His glorious resurrection. Lent gives us an opportunity to turn back toward the story of the cross and the sacrifice that was made for our lives.

I encourage you to be intentional about your practice of our Discipleship Five this lent.

Worship: Be more intentional about attending or watching the online offerings of our worship service. Be mindful when you are in worship. Focus on responding to God.

Grow: Study God's word during lent. There is an emphasis on five in our study of the Discipleship Five. Choose a book of the bible and begin reading five verses per day or listen to five minutes of bible reading through an app. There are many options for accessing God's word.

Serve: Look for ways that you can serve God's people during lent. Opportunities are everywhere, you just need to be looking.

Give: Be intentional about giving. Give to your local church. Live out that membership vow. Give to local charity. Support a cause.

Share: Talk to someone about how God has impacted your life. These conversations do not have to be difficult. Make a brief mention of how you turned to God on a bad day. Share how God has spoken to you this year. Share your star word! (Mine is anchor, by the way).

Remember, discipleship is a marathon and not a sprint. This journey that we are on is shown through us faithfully taking one step after another.

In all things we seek His holy wisdom.

Greetings from the Missions Team.

Mission work at St. Paul's continue into 2021. The Third Sunday Ingathering (yellow buckets) for January collect was \$35. This money is sent to First Call For Help (FCFH) and is used to assist Seneca County residents in times of need. Some of the types of assistance given are help with medical equipment or medical bills, emergency housing, rental assistance, and utility assistance. This program is meant to bridge a gap to other programs. FCH refers to other agencies according to the need, such as Salvation Army, Job and Family Services/PRC, National Machinery Foundation, HEAP/PIPP (Heat Energy Assistance Program/Percentage of Income Payment Plan), and Great Lakes Community Action Partnership (formerly WSOS). The FCFH also provides school supplies for needy children and has a Christmas for Teens program (we contribute to this in a separate mission endeavor). The Third Sunday Ingathering for February will be held on the 2nd Sunday due to conflict with another mission.

In February St. Paul's participates in the Church World Service (CWS) Blankets and Kits program. This money is collected on the Third Sunday of February. An Impact Report for 2019 showed that this money supported the provision of 59,173 blankets, 19,923 hygiene kits, 9,143 emergency clean-up buckets, and 7,800 school kits. These were distributed internationally in Syria, Greece, Ecuador, and the Dominican Republic.

St. Paul's is a small cog in a very big wheel. We are proud to be doing our part, thank you Church.
