Prayer Focus

As the New Year begins we could continue to pray for the peace that is the hope of Christmas. For so many here and around the world there is

no peace. We can pray for those children and adults who were tragically killed in the school shooting in the Sandy Hook School in Connecticut. And for the survivors who must grieve and continue to live. How difficult will the new school term be, even in a new school building! Let us continue to pray for the many others who are killed each month in our nation including the three shot in a Pennsylvania church before Christmas. Pray too for all of those who are working to reduce the number of violent deaths.

Wars continue. In Syria the end does not appear near. The use of cluster booms to destroy homes and the civilian residents of small towns is a new tragedy. Hundreds of thousands have been forced from their homes, many into neighboring Turkey. There are many fatalities in Afghanistan as that war continues. There are other wars including the one in Sudan. All of the leaders, warriors and innocents of the world need out prayer.

Elsewhere many are afflicted with diseases. A cholera epidemic envelops coastal slums in Sierra Leone and neighboring Guinea which lack toilets. The disease's often fatal symptoms—diarrhea, vomiting and severe dehydration—were experienced by 13,000 according to Doctors Without Borders. Some 300 have died. Similarly the war in the Sudans has led to outbreaks of severe malnutrition, malaria and diarrheal disease. In Haiti Hurricane Sandy destroyed or damaged 61 cholera centers leading to fears of fresh outbreaks of an epidemic that has killed more than 7,5000 since 2010. Prayers for those hungry and sickened by these horrible conditions.

Continue also to pray for those who continue to suffer after serving in our armed services. Those have been maimed; those who are emotionally disturbed either from the injury or from what they've experienced need our prayers. Finally as a nation we are beginning to notice these afflictions and more opportunities to help are being offered.

Let us continue to keep in prayer the many programs of St. Paul's. May our efforts to help those in need be pleasing to Him.




Sharing Kitchen

Thanksgiving was celebrated on November 19 with a dinner complete from turkey to pumpkin pie! During the eight serving days of the month 127 volunteers served 346 adults and 20 children.

The annual Christmas party was held on Dec. 15. It was the largest we've ever had. Gifts were given to 150 adults and 95

children. There were many gifts including children's gifts, gifts for men and women, a lovely jewelry table, toys for children and a very large number of hats and mittens. Each adult received a bag of taxable item including paper towels, dish and personal soaps, toothpaste and toilet tissue. Many worked on the Saturday set-up and many more on the day of the party. Thanks to all who contributed and worked to bring joy to so many.



ST. PAUL'S IN MISSION

Thanks to all who so generously shared with those in need both here in the community and around the world during the holidays. Twenty-two local children received Christmas gifts of toys and clothing through the Angel Tree. \$617 was sent to World Vision for chickens, rabbits, fruit trees, soccer balls and a water well during the Alternative Gift Fair. The Thanksgiving envelope offering of \$170 or more helped Connections, which meets right here in our own church. And the Christmas envelope offering is to help those in our community who can't pay for heat through the winter months.

Just because the holidays are over we don't want to forget about those who are still in need. There will be opportunities to help by giving on Human Relations Sunday January 13th, donating to Blankets and Tools on February 10th, bringing food and other items for FISH during Lent, placing peanut butter for Haiti in a box in the narthex during February and March, placing money for the Sharing Kitchen in your Easter envelope and putting some coins or bills in the Third Sunday yellow buckets.

On January 27th you can help feed people in our own church by making a donation during the Soup and Sandwich lunch. That offering will go to the Ecumenical Sharing

Kitchen. So mark your calendar and bring your appetite on the 27th. Serving will start immediately following the worship service and continue until everyone has eaten. We don't want those who go to Sunday School to miss out so they may reserve their favorite soup or sandwich after church and eat it after Sunday School. We'll keep it warm for you!

For those of you who like to sew there are patterns to make school bags in the church office. These will go to UMCOR for children around the world.

Always remember how fortunate you are to have enough food, clothing, heat and the other necessities of life. And don't forget that Jesus told us to share what we have with the poor and needy.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE DECEMBER 6, 2012 ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL MEETING

Education: The Children's Christmas Program is December 16th with rehearsal on December 9th. The children's bell choir will play for church three times in December.

Missions: The Alternative Gift Fair was successful with many items purchased for families in poverty around the world. Thanksgiving envelope giving provided \$170 for Connections. The Christmas envelope money is designated for the Emergency Heating Fund in the community. Thirty-one shoeboxes were filled and delivered to Samaritan's Purse. The Morrison House for homeless families on West Perry Street is now open. Several St. Paul's people toured the house before the residents moved in. The Angel Tree had twenty-two names of children in the community who will receive gifts from the members of St. Paul's. A Soup and

Sandwich lunch is scheduled for January 27th. The next special Sunday is Human Relations Sunday on January 20th. Members are urged to support these special Sundays.

Finance: Expenses have been cut because of the installation of insulation, lower gas prices and no custodian. Volunteers have been doing an excellent job taking over the cleaning. Although many members increased their giving as a result of the letter sent to members the overall giving is down. Apportionments are paid to date and should be lower in 2013.

Trustees: The elevator has been repaired. The chandelier was partially cleaned by volunteers and will be completed when scaffolding is set up to reach the higher portions. New halogen bulbs were installed. The trustees are getting the building prepared for winter.

Sharing Kitchen: Two freezers have been donated – one is in the garage and one is in the basement. Many donations of food have come in recently. The Christmas party is December 15th.

Youth: Eighteen went to see the live nativity scene at St. Francis. A movie night is scheduled for December 18th.

Outreach: The website is up and running thanks to Kyle Paxson. Further updates will be coming soon. Brochures are being prepared and mugs to give to first time visitors will be ordered.

An advertisement of the church services will appear in the Advertiser-Tribune before Christmas. A picture directory may be prepared in the future. A family night will soon be planned. Having family nights is one of this year's goals. Some repairs of the sound system and possible new equipment to record the worship service on DVD will be explored. Bill Daniel was elected vice-chairman of the Administrative

Council. Hillary Chapman will fill in as secretary during the winter months.


Have you seen St. Paul's new website? If you haven't, be sure to
