## **Prayer Focus**

As I write we're in the midst of beautiful trees with leaves falling like snowflakes. Soon Thanksgiving will be upon us, the leaves will be gone and

snowflakes real. What a wonderful natural world we live in. Praise God!

But where humans are concerned all is not so wonderful. For several months we've been praying about Syria. Each day brings news of more violence. Now tensions are high between Syria and Turkey as well as between Lebanon and Syria. We need to pray the war does not escalate. Hundreds of thousands have fled Syria to Turkey, Lebanon and Jordan, living in tent camps. It was reported that on one day alone 28,000 people fled. That's more than live in the Tiffin area! Can you imagine all of us packing the things we could manage to transport and moving to Canada? Almost weekly the Christian Science Monitor has a picture of children trying to survive in a camp somewhere. Let us continue to pray for the children who lives are being forever altered. Remember we can contribute to their care by writing our checks to St. Paul's and marking "Syria" in the memo.

Pray too for the violence in Afghanistan where it is becoming increasingly difficult for our troops to know who is friend and who enemy. Pray that the factions in that country and neighboring Pakistan can learn to live together in peace.

One Christian Science Monitor cover story focused on the poor in the United States. While governmental figures show 46 million in poverty many different conditions have developed. Some people are hungry, others have difficulty paying rent, still others forgo needed medical treatment. Some of the poor can't get food stamps, others are declared ineligible for Medicaid. And the problem won't go away as most jobs created since 2008 are low wage and

predictions are this will continue until at least 2020. So many need prayers.

Prayers too for our local youth, many of whom have undesirable issues. Poverty, psychological problems, abandonment. So pray for Youth Club, Connections, Youth Fellowship, The Landing and those adults who give of their time to work with those who so need Christian love.

In this season of Thanksgiving may we give praise for God's love and all the blessings we have.

#### Sharing Kitchen

The annual Christmas party has been set for Dec. 15 at 11-12 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Light refreshments will be served and Santa will greet guests with his bag of gifts for all. This world wide project of Samaritan's Purse sends Christmas boxes of toys and goodies to children both here and abroad. \$7 is needed to ship the boxes so if you are not able to shop for items to put in the box maybe you could donate toward the cost of shipping. Some local churches fill over one hundred. Wouldn't it be great if St. Paul's could do that!

This year's Thanksgiving envelope offering will be given to Connections. This community group of youth and families is now meeting in our church and need our support. Many of those attending have no church home and we are happy to give them a place to meet on Tuesday evenings.

Donations, food and volunteers are always needed.

Our Christmas envelope offering is designated for the Emergency Heating Fund. This is used to help families who haven't enough income to pay for heat. This winter is expected to be colder than last year so many families will need this extra help. Be generous!

Upcoming special Sundays are United Methodist Student Day on November 25<sup>th</sup> and Human Relations Sunday on January 20<sup>th</sup>. Watch for information and an envelope in your bulletin on those Sundays.

Plans are being made for another Alternative Gift Fair. Remember all the clever animal displays last year?

Once again there will be an Angel Tree. Twenty-two names of needy children in the community will be on the tree with suggestions for items they would like for Christmas. These will be available on the first Sunday in December.

### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SEPTEMBER 27, 2012 ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL MEETING

Finance: Letters have been sent to members which resulted in extra donations to the church. Because of having a full time pastor our expenses have gone up by

\$12,000 to \$15,000. Committees were to submit requests for the 2013 budget. The final budget will be voted on during the October Administrative Council meeting. Our apportionments are paid to date. Income for August was \$8,609.28 and expenses were \$9,251.61.

Trustees: The lighted sign on the corner of Madison and Monroe Streets has been installed and many compliments have been received. The roof of PatchWorks House was replaced and St. Paul's made a loan to PatchWorks House to complete the project. Jeff Kuhn of Miller Steam Extraction donated his time and materials to clean the sanctuary and front hall carpet as well as the front restrooms. All custodial work is being done by volunteers.

Missions: St. Paul's members are scheduled to cook and serve the Sharing Kitchen meals on October 15<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. The Christmas Child shoebox project will be held in October and November. Shoeboxes are to be ordered from Samaritan's Purse. Members are asked to take one or more boxes and fill them. 324 pencils, 69 erasers, 42 rulers and \$17.26 were donated by our members and the VBS children for the local school supply project. A table was set up at Heidelberg University for their Around the Town event on September 12th. Water, candy, bookmarks and information about St. Paul's were distributed to students and staff. Pastor Hannah gave a prayer for the Seneca Habitat for Humanity as part of the recent house dedications. Several people have provided lunches for Habitat volunteers. Upcoming events are World Wide Communion, United Methodist Student Sunday, Alternative Gift Fair and the Angel Tree.

Education: Rally Day was August 26<sup>th</sup>. An adult Sunday School class is being led by Pastor Hannah. Youth Fellowship will meet on the first and third Sundays. Children's church will continue. Youth helpers will be listed in the bulletin. Thirty four children

attended VBS with Kyle Paxson and Jani Yanni as leaders. Youth Club registration is October 3<sup>rd</sup> with the first session on October 10<sup>th</sup>. The Christmas program is scheduled for December 16<sup>th</sup>. There may be a new confirmation class. Three CD/tape players and one CD player have been purchased

Staff Parish: A Compass Group Pastor Parish Relations Convocation with the District Superintendent was held at Willard First UMC on September 25<sup>th</sup> with five St. Paul's people attending. The Charge/Church Conference is to be at 7:00 p.m. Monday, October 29<sup>th</sup> at Willard.

Outreach: A letter was sent to inactive members. Responses were received from twelve who wished to have their names removed from the roles or transferred to other churches. Eleven chose to continue their membership at St. Paul's. There were no responses from some and it was impossible to find addresses for others. A website is being set up by Kyle Paxson.

Connections: The community wide youth and family sessions, will be held at St. Paul's on Tuesdays. Workers, food and donations are welcome.
