#### **All-Church Dinner Report**

Our annual roast beef dinner on November 9 was a lot of work, but it was a success! So many church members presold dinner orders that we had to cut off orders almost a week before the dinner. We had set our maximum at 250 and we had prepaid orders for 248 dinners – 233 adult and 15 child (age 12 and under).

In addition to the ticket sales, income included:

additions to the ticket price

extra donations to cover the cost of dinner ingredients/supplies

sale of leftover meat after the dinner

donations at Sunday's coffee hour fellowship time when we served the leftover pie

Our income total was over \$3,800 and expenses were about \$1,000, so we should have cleared close to 2,800. We all know that food prices are high right now, but Reynolds managed to give us a good price on the beef and we shopped sales as much as possible to keep the prices down. The take-out containers increase the total dinner costs. We experimented with some dinner containers that were more environmentally-friendly this year.

As always, the church dinner is about more than making money. It's the ALL-CHURCH Dinner because it takes all of the church to make it happen. This dinner brings us together - to do the planning; take orders; clean the kitchen; cook and slice the meat; peel and mash potatoes (80 pounds!); make the gravy; bake and cut pies; serve the dinners into containers; fill orders; and wash the dishes. And – although it's hectic on the dinner night - we have fun doing it.

One interesting side note is that a church member made a donation to pay for some dinners for some persons in need. Just a week before the dinner, we had someone stop by the church – a grandmother of a family of five who were in need. We were able to give a little help to that family by providing them with a hot meal on the night of our dinner. God pointed them in our direction!
