#### FINANCIAL UPDATE

The 2021 proposed budget was presented to the leadership committee at their October meeting. It will now go to the charge/church annual conference on November 5<sup>th</sup> for final approval.

While putting figures together for the budget process, I felt it would be a good time to give our membership an update on our finances for the current year. 2020 was indeed an unusual year for Glendive United Methodist Church. Beginning with the vandalism on Christmas Eve 2019 and then the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, we were unable to be in our church for almost seven months. Thankfully we were able to worship through the use of live streaming.

As a result of all these changes, our financial situation has seen some changes too. I am only going to list the figures for the **General Fund** as that is the majority of our income and expenses.

	<u>2019</u>	2020
EXPENSES -	\$87,111	\$85,315 (November & December estimated)
INCOME -	\$88,964	\$74,814 (November & December estimated)

As these figures show, the expenses have stayed pretty stable. However, the income for 2020 has dropped considerably. Our general giving has decreased by approximately \$6,000 and the lack of any fundraising events (rummage sale, harvest auction and roast beef dinner) accounts for the other \$8000.
